## Local and Other Matters

FROM TUESDAY'S DAILY, JAN. 27:

**Third Term.**—The B. Y. Academy, at Provo, started the third term of its current academic year on Monday, with a total enrollment of 270 names, far in advance of the opening day's register of any previous term.

**Amputation.**—Wm. Jones, of Kaysville, the young man we mentioned the other evening as having accidentally shot himself through the instep of his right foot, at Grass Mountain last Tuesday, has had his foot amputated in order to save his life. The wound was more dangerous than at first supposed, and the case is still looked upon as serious.

**"Still They Come!"**—Another petition, praying for the removal of the political disabilities of women, has made its appearance in the Legislature. Yesterday afternoon, Representative Murdock presented a paper to that effect, signed by 333 ladies of Beaver County. Three separate motions were made as to its disposition, Mr. Murdock wishing it to go to the committee on judiciary, Mr. Hatch desiring its reference to the committee on petitions and memorials and Mr. Farr moving that it be laid upon the table to come up with the bill on the subject, now lying there.

It was decided to refer it to the committee on judiciary.

### Tar and Feathers.

At about a quarter past 12 this morning a party of some 25 masked men called at the office of the *Morning Rustler*, and seizing Mr. King, the city editor of that paper, forcibly took him from the office in the presence of the entire force. He was securely held and gagged with a handkerchief which was thrust into his mouth, and conveyed to the rear of a building a little south of the *Rustler* office, where some coal tar was hastily smeared upon his face and neck, and a few handfuls of feathers applied, after which the party withdrew in a hurry, Mr. King following with the hope of recognizing some of the party, but, we believe, to no purpose.—*Sunction*.

**Murray Confirmed.**—To-day's dispatches announce that Hon. Eli H. Murray, of Kentucky, has been confirmed Governor of Utah Territory.

**For Stealing.**—James Dickerson, for stealing goods from Z. C. M. I. on the 21st inst, was arrested last night, pleaded guilty this morning, and was fined \$25.

**Vagrants.**—Three vagrants applied at the police station, last night, and at their own request, were sentenced to 15 days labor, each, on the public streets.

Another was unwillingly fined \$10 for his offense.

**Robbery.**—A miner was robbed of \$20 by two men, on First East Street last evening, about 11:45. It occurred a short distance below the Delta Saloon. One of the men struck him while the other went through his pockets. The robbers have not yet been caught.

**Badly Frozen.**—A man named Henry Deghie, was found on the North Bench, this morning, badly frozen, and taken to the City Hall. He had \$93 on his person. He was taken, to-day, to the St. Mark's Hospital for treatment.

**Resisting the Officers.**—Last night, a cutting affray took place on Commercial Street between two Chinamen. The injured one complained to the police, who went in quest of the assailant, but could not find him. The proprietor of a house where the fugitive was supposed to have taken refuge, refusing to admit the police, was arrested and this morning fined \$25.

**One Case Only.**—The Supreme Court held a short session this morning, all the Justices being in attendance. There was but one case disposed of, that of Charlotte Arthur, appellant, vs. Brigham Young et al., executors, respondents. It was argued by E. F. Dunne and G. O. Goldthwaite for appellant and J. L. Rawlins for respondent, submitted and taken under advisement by the Court.

The Court then adjourned until to-morrow, at 10 a. m.

**Supreme Court.**—The case of E. A. Wall, appellant and respondent, vs. A. E. D. Dge, et al., appellants and respondents, was argued and submitted, in the Supreme Court to-day.

**Badly Bruised.**—Wm. Everill, an employe at the Temple Block, was badly bruised this afternoon by a block of granite falling against his legs from behind, and trapping him between it and the block he was engaged in cutting. A surgeon was immediately summoned to attend the patient.

**Condolence.**—We extend our heart-felt sympathy to the family of Mr. William Fuller, foreman of our morning cotemporary, the *Herald*, in the loss of their little daughter, aged 10 years, who fell a victim to diphtheria, yesterday morning at 10 o'clock. She was a bright and promising little girl, her parents' oldest child. The funeral will take place to-morrow morning, at 10:30 o'clock.

**Detained by Snow.**—Inhabitants of the city near the railway depot, were a little surprised, last night, to hear the whistle of a locomotive about 10 o'clock, on the Utah Central. It was the 8:20 passenger train, which had been delayed through waiting for the freight train ahead, blocked by snow between Farmington and Kaysville. The express train north, yesterday morning, was stalled at the same place, and though due in Ogden at 9 a. m., did not reach there until 11 o'clock.

**Another County.**—And now the citizens of Ashley's Fork want to secede from the Un— from Wasatch, and organize Coal County, with the county seat at Ashley. The reasons assigned in the petition, signed by 136 residents, presented yesterday to the Legislature, are that Ashley is 150 miles from Heber City, the present county seat of Wasatch, and that the inhabitants of the former place, to reach the latter point, are forced to traverse a route rendered almost impassable the main portion of the year, by bad weather, etc. "We are sorry for you, Thomas Hawkins, very sorry," and hope the Assembly will allow you to depart in peace and set up for yourselves.
