THREE MONTHS RECORD.

Total of 1,182 Killed and 18,688 Injured in 3,672 Accidents.

Jured in 3.672 Accidents. Accident builtein No. 21 covering three months ending Sept. 30, 1906, is out. This, a publication issued by the interstate commerce commission shows that during these three months 1.182 persons were killed and 18.688 injured. The causes of wrecks and accidents are as varied as the whims of a spolled offid. A surprisingly few of the wrecks are caused by inefficiency of trainmen. Dispatchers are responsible for a small when the responsibility resting upon their shoulders is considered. Collis-ions are the greatest cause of wracks and these are caused in many instances by misinterpretation of orders, etc. The total number of collisions and de-ratiments in the quarter reviewed was 8.672 (1.881 collisions) of which 269 col-lisions and 201 derailments affected passenger trains. The damages to cars engines and roadway amounted to \$2.92.760.

B. F. YOAKUM SPEAKS.

"Anti-Railway Agitation Will Retard But Not Stop Present Prosperity."

Chicago, Feb. 28.—'I do not take such a gloomy view of the situation and pro-spects of this country as some of my railway friends do." said B. F. Yoa-kum, chairman of the executive com-mittee of the Rock Island-Frisco sys-

kim, chairmain of the security contribution of the Bock Island-Frisco sys-tem, who arrived here yesterday from New York. "This country is too big and too pow-erful to be ruined," continued Mr. Yoa-kum. "It is bound to grow bigger and stronger, and the railways will grow with it. They will not be ruined by the agitation today over their opera-tions and rates. It is unfortunate that this outburst of bostility toward the railways and adverse litigation should come just at a time when the railroads are confronted with the necessity of securing yast amounts of money in order to make the extensions and improvements necessary to the de-mands of the country for transporta-tion facilities.

"The anti-railway agitation today will retard, but not stop, the develop-ment and improvement of the railroads. They will be obliged to expend just as much money as they can econom-ically in order to take care of the business now in sight for them. They cannot let their lines deteriorate or sin sight today enough business to keep all the roads busy for a year at least. The improvements and extensions, how-ever, will be inslited by the ability of the railroads to secure men and money to do the work. Some of the larger plans for improvement of terminals and the construction of new lines may be deferred until seneral conditions re-turn to a more normal state, but the railroads must go right along with the general policy of improving their facilities for doing more business."

House From Juab, Extols His County.

HAS BIGGEST MINE IN STATE.

Arid Land Farming Carried on Extensively in Eastern Valley, Known As Agricultural Section.

Probably the youngest member of the house of representatives is Braxton Barnett, of Mammoth, Juab county, who represents the Thirteenth district in the state legislature. Mr. Barnett comes from the mining section of Juab county, comprising what is known as the Tintic district. He has been a resident of Juab for eight years during which time he has been successfully engaged in leasing and developing min-

ing properties in and near Mammoth.

ing properties in and near Mammoth. "The Tintic side is enjoying quite a boom," said Mr. Barnett today, "as a result of the higher prices being paid for copper, sliver and lead, and the district never was in a more prosperous condition than at present. A peculiar-ity of the Tintle district is that all four precious metals—gold, sliver, copper and lead—are found in its mines, and there is not a single mine that does not contain all four, excepting, of course, the iron mines. "The inhabited portion of Juab coun-ty is divided into two sections, known as the mining and the agricultural sec-tion. Commencing at the northern end of the Tintic mountains is found the town of Knightsville, named after 'Uncle' Jesse Knight, whose mines, the Godiva, Uncle Sam. May Day and Yan-kee, are located there. On the eastern slope are found the Beck Tunnel, Colo-rado and the new corporation known as the Iron Blossom, and nearby the Carisa. All these properties are being rapidly developed, and are now ship-ping ore. "Following round on the southern

rapidly developed, and are now ship-ping ore. "Following round on the southern slope of the mountains, we find such well known properties as the Star Con-solidated. Tintic Iron mine, and the Victor Consolidated. Eack to the west on the Mammoth side, we have the Elack Jack, Lower Mammoth, Ajax, Mammoth, the Grand Central and the new mine the Opex, which is a copper property being developed by Augustus Heinze of Butte and his associates. "Arriving at the northwestern slope there is the famous Eureka district, leading up with perhaps the greatest dividend paying mine in the state the Centennial Eureka. Other mines in this section are the Eagle, the Blue Bell, and the Gamini, all of which are big producers of gold, sliver, copper and lead. DON'T "PINCH OUT."
