## THE MEETING WAS HELD TODAY

The Week Closes With the Sale | The Eagle & Blue Bell Company Closes the Year With a Deficit.

Dr. Franklin Brings Down Fine Looking Samples - Prest. Dern Returns Home - At The Sunbeam.

The annual meeting of the Eagle and Blue Bell Mining company, which was scheduled to take place this morning. was postponed until this afternoon. The report of the secretary of the company shows that during the past year 205 tons of ore were marketed from the property, which netted \$7,961.04. With the exception of an average of 13 ounces silver per ton, the values were all n gold. The above returns show the value per ton to be almost \$39. Under the management of Mr. Jackson Mc-Chrystal some 6,000 feet of development work has been done since work was started two years ago. While this work has opened up immense amounts of milling ore the bodies of shipping ore found have been comparatively small. The work done during the past year has been more than could be paid for from the mine, hence the company closes the fiscal year with an indebtedness of \$10,874.67. As an offfiset to this, however, there are yet 7,950 shares of stock in the treasury, which will not be disposed of at present market prices. The company has no thought of shutting down, but will continue to pursue development work as heretofore. It is presumed that the old board will be resolved.
