Upwards of one million in gold
was sent from 115th to 115th, 11th to 10th
St. Louis, 8.—The storm a few
days past has done great damage
to property of various kinds in this
and adjoining States. At the
front Mo., 8.—Tuesday night
Vicksburg mill of A. K. Smith was
demolished and a large stock of
wool and manufactured goods de-
stroyed. The store house of E. M.
Kreit was also demolished, and
many were torn from their foundations
and greatly injured. The Metho-
dists church at Ottsville, Mo., was
totally destroyed and several houses
badly damaged. The growing crops
were also severely injured in
locating the wheat particularly.
In some places it is said that not
more than half the crop will be
distributed to the public.

INDIANAPOLIS.—The California

against the company for the deliv-
ery of freights without the pay-
ment of such charges.

filled with smoke immediately.

The extent of the damage is not yet ascer-
tained, though no serious damage
by the tunnel is apprehended.
