## SESSION OF CITY COUNCIL

Routine and Minor Business Disposed of by Junction City Solons.

### STORY OF VAKOS' CAPTURE.

Blinded Officers for a Day and Two Nights—Intercepted When Trying To Reach Salt Lake.

Ogden, April 6.—Little was done outside of routine business at the session of the city council last night. The most important thing was the presentation of a number of petitions of citizens in various parts of the town asking for an extension of the watermain. One of them from West Ogden, setting forth the necessity of water for fire protection. It was signed by the Ogden Packing and Provision company and many residents. All these petitions were referred to the special waterworks committee, and on motion of Councilman Perry it was voted that the council, as a committee of the whole, would visit these districts next Friday at 3 o'clock. M. S. Browning and a number of others petitioned for the formation of a paving district from Twenty-sixth to Twenty-eighth street, on Washington avenue.

Seven old liquor licenses and four paymaster's licenses were extended for a quarter from April 1. Pay rolls amounting to \$1,631.67 were allowed and pay rolls amounting to \$65.65 for the waterworks department for two weeks were allowed. Bills for pipe and other material for that department amounting to \$5,704.30 were allowed.

L. N. Fulton, clerk of the city court, reported the collection of \$2,591.30 in fines, during March.

Fifteen cases of contagious diseases were reported.

Ivy Williams, clerk of the board of education, sent in a communication saying that the board would like to pay off a note of \$2,236, and favorable action was taken.

Councilman Dickson submitted a resolution calling for sealed bids on city advertising, to be submitted at the next meeting of the city council, and the resolution carried.

Councilman Powers complained of the dogs, said they were about to take the town, and that the dog tax collector was too old to perform his duty. On motion the office was declared vacant.

### CAPTURE OF NICK VAKOS.

Nick Vakos, the Greek who murdered John Contos on Saturday night, and who was run to earth yesterday noon at Clearfield, southwest of Ogden about eight miles by Sheriff Barlow B. Williams.

son, Deputy Sheriff John Hutchens, Detective J. P. Bender and Capt. Brown were safely landed in jail shortly after noon.

Early in the day word reached the city from Ray that the fugitive had been seen in that neighborhood. Within five minutes the officers named were speeding south on an Oregon Short Line train. The trainmen had orders to stop on signal. The officers took up their position on the rear platform, and the train sped between Ray and Clearfield. Vakos disappeared from the side of the track. Quickly as possible the train was brought to a stand, but half a mile had been covered before this was accomplished. Back over the track rushed the posse, and Vakos disappeared into the country going east. E. V. Steed informed the officers when they reached his place that he had seen the man sitting by the side of the road. He took a shotgun and joined in the chase. Although a lane, by the side of an empty road, and finally along an irrigating ditch they followed the footprints, and Vakos was discovered lying in the bottom.

of the ditch covered with dry weeds and debris. Two of the officers had passed him. Four guns were leveled and he was ordered to throw up his hands. For a moment he hesitated. The order was repeated and then he went one hand, followed by the other. He was completely unmaneuvered from hunger and lack of rest.

The officers with their prisoner were waiting at Clearfield to flag a train in order to get back to Ogden when Jacob Jensen of the Hooley car came by in his automobile. Into this Vakos was bundled with a part of the officers, and in a short time was behind the bars in the county jail. He made no attempt to deny the killing at Contos, nor to shift the responsibility.

"Poor John!" he said at the jail. "He's dead, and I suppose I will be soon. It's too bad."

Vakos told how he eluded the officers Saturday night and Sunday until he could get out of the city going towards Salt Lake. The next he heard of him was from James Albert, a railroad fireman, at Ray, and former Constable L. Stokely of that place. They caught sight of the man and recognized him from the descriptions sent broadcast. They at once communicated with the officers in Ogden, and prepared to keep the man in sight until the arrival of the officers. They did not care to undertake the capture themselves, as they were unarmed, while Vakos still carried his .44-caliber Colt's automatic.

While they were debating what to do, a freight train came along, and Vakos jumped aboard. The brakeman recognized the man and tried to get him into the cab on the pretext that he should shovel coal to pay for his passage. James and Stokely were on the train. A mile and a half out the fugitive jumped off and again took to the open country. James and Stokely continued on to Clearfield, and made the arrest by communicating with the authorities, who got on the trail immediately and the capture followed.

The inquest on the body of John Contos was commenced today.
