Bishop Thomas Taylor is still in Iron County, looking after his Iron interests.

The Ogden Herald of Saturday says: At 3 o'clock this afternoon, Myer Seckel and Frank Treeder, who were arrested on suspicion of having Mr. A. Greenwell in a large sum of money and a number of important papers, were arraigned before Justice Middleton, for a preliminary hearing. Seckel asked for further time to plead, and Treeder pleaded "not guilty."

From the official report of ex-Surveyor-General Mason, which is to be embodied in the report of the Secretary of the Interior to Congress in December next, we learn that Montana's population increased 10,000 in the past year; that her mines have turned out \$3,500,000 in gold and \$5,000,000 in silver, and that her health in live stock is estimated at the sum of \$3,259,084.

Joseph Chatrand, a lad 12 years old, attending school at the Central School-house, met with quite a serious accident yesterday. It is supposed that he fell over the banister of the stairway, probably in an attempt to slide down the rail. TABERNACLE SERVICES.

The usual Sabbath service of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints were held in the Assembly Hall yesterday afternoon. The choir sang:

To Him who made the world, The sun, the moon and stars, Ye children of our God, Ye Saints of latter days.

Opening prayer by Bishop S. A. Woolley.

The first speaker was Elder John B. Sorenson, a returned missionary. He arose, by request, to give a brief account of his labors in the ministry. About two years ago he was called to go on a mission to New Zealand. On arriving there, he and his companions visited different churches, soliciting opportunities to preach. Their presence in Auckland created a considerable stir, and many here were circulated about the truth, and within a few months a branch was organized. Those who identified themselves with the work, bore testimony to its truth. A discussion was held, and proceeded to a place about 300 miles distant. He dreamed that there was a field there not harvested. Also that there was a man named Na-plear that would join the Church. He went there and that man embraced the gospel, and not only he but several others—enough coming in to organize a branch. He left the local church to preside over the branch and proceeded to the settlements in what are called the backwoods. A discussion was held, the presence of a large congregation with a Lutheran Priest. Elder Sorenson and his companion were enabled by the Spirit of God, to utterly confound the priest, and completely won him to the faith. He was put to shame that his own congregation turned against him, and they have since thrown him off. Several persons came forward and requested baptism at the hands of the brethren. Elder Sorenson proceeded to another part alone. In the meantime more Elders arrived from Utah, and a new president was appointed to take charge of the mission—Elder W. M. Bromley. Elder Sorenson was sent by the president to assist him, and the two labored together for some time, and then separated. He baptized a family in one place he visited, and subsequently went among the natives of New Zealand. While on the mission he baptized 37 persons who had never been in the Church before, besides three who had been baptized in Europe, fallen away and come back again; he had proclaimed the gospel in 60 different towns and settlements. In 40 of which the gospel had never before been preached; he had suffered persecutions and had on three occasions been struck. He had been led in his labors by the blessing of God. He bore testimony that the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints is the true and only church of God. The speaker exhorted the Saints to faithfulness, that being the only course by which the blessings of the Lord could be secured and enjoyed.

Elder James H. Moyle next addressed the congregation. He recently returned from a mission to the Southern States. He rejoiced to be once more at home, to assemble with the Saints here, and to hear the instructions of the servants of the Lord. Elder Moyle proceeded to give an account of his missionary labors and experience over a period of nearly two years and a half. As we lately gave a statement in the News of his ministry, it is unnecessary to repeat it now. He impressed upon the young the necessity of making the best of their home opportunities for improving in a knowledge of the principles of the gospel. He said that he would repeat to some of the Saints here, who had husbands, that he would repeat to the missionary field in the South, were in a state of anxiety regarding the danger to which they are supposed to be exposed. True, persecution sometimes raged, but God protects his servants, and when opposition is aroused, it is a general rule that there are some who will receive the gospel. Many of those who do not believe as we do, acknowledge that a power accompanies the Elders that is not with any other class of men. The speaker described the condition of people of the South, in the heads of many of whom the bitter memories of the war of the Rebellion still lingered to a considerable extent. They were, however, greatly divided, politically, religiously and every other way. Should there ever be another civil war, instead of the combatants being two great divisions, the struggle would be between innumerable factions, as predicted by the Prophet Joseph Smith.

The choir sang the anthem: Awake, put on thy strength O Zion.

Benediction by Elder James W. Cummings.

The Mandamus Case.—The arguments in the alternative mandamus, issued at the instance of N. P. Gray, liquor dealer, summoning Justice Pyper to appear and show cause why a peremptory mandamus should not issue, were heard before Judge Twiss on Saturday afternoon. The matter was submitted and taken under advisement until Wednesday morning, when the decision will probably be given. The object of the proceeding is to compel Justice Pyper to send liquor cases on appeal to the District Court without collecting costs from defendants.

An Epidemic.—Within the last two weeks there have been a great many cases of mumps among the children of this city. In some schools the complaint has afflicted a large proportion of the pupils, and we understand that, in some instances, the teachers have not escaped. The disease seldom assumes a dangerous form, except when the patient is exposed to cold and damp. It is very important that the person afflicted should be kept warm. The malady is generally confined to juveniles, but occasionally attacks grown people as well.

Another Well Known Citizen Gone.—

We learn, by private dispatch to Brother Alma Pratt, that Brother George Bebe, a well known citizen of Provo, died at 8 a. m. today.
