

Our Country Contemporaries

Ogden Junction, Oct. 19—

About three weeks ago, Thomas Hull, Sen., of Hooper City, provided a man named Richard Lowry with a home, as the latter was in destitute circumstances, on condition that Lowry would assist in the fall work on the farm.

On the 7th inst. Mr. Hull being under the necessity of raising some money, it was arranged to send Lowry to Salt Lake with a load of grain to sell, and he accordingly started in company with Mr. Hull's son Brigham, who went with another team.

The wheat was sold for \$40.50 in cash, and on Thursday, the 8th inst., Lowry and Mr. Hull left the city together, but on arriving at the Bath House just outside of town, the former declined to come any further at that time, making the excuse that he had to get some hay for the horses, but telling Mr. Hull that he would overtake him that night, but Mr. Hull on arriving at Hooper, reported Lowry in the rear. About 12 o'clock that night, fearing something wrong had happened in consequence of Lowry's non-appearance, Thomas Hull, Sen., started his two sons Brigham and William with a team, on the back track. They drove to Salt Lake without hearing of him, and on arriving there and looking around town, found the team Lowry had driven, hitched to the wagon and standing on Commercial Street, but could find nothing of Lowry, who had evidently decamped with the money received for the wheat. Mr. Hull's sons returned home with the team, which had evidently been without food or drink for two nights and one day.

On learning of the occurrence, Constable Gilbert Belknap, Jr. started in pursuit. He tracked the thief from Salt Lake City westward, and finally overhauled him at Sheridan Smelting works in Tooele County, and brought him back. Lowry says he bought a suit of clothes and got drunk, and knows nothing of the balance of the money.

Ogden Junction, Oct. 20—

By letter to D. M. Stuart, Esq., we learn that Mr. A. J. Kershaw of St. Louis, who recently visited this city, met with a severe accident while returning home. On arriving at Kansas City he got on the Northern Kansas train instead of the Missouri Pacific, but discovering his mistake he got off and returned to the depot, arriving just as the M. P. had started. In attempting to get aboard he fell over a switch bar putting his shoulder out of joint and severely bruising his arm and side. A surgeon put his shoulder in place and he was able to start home next day, but he has suffered severely ever since. This will be a source of great regret to Mr. Kershaw's many friends in Utah.

Yesterday afternoon the engine drawing the Utah Northern train, due here at 4:30 p. m., was thrown from the track a short distance this side of Ogden River, at a point where a wagon road crosses the line. The accident was caused by some small stones which had been placed between the rails and the planks of the crossing, thus filling up the groove through which the flanges of the car wheels pass. When the engine reached the spot, the front driving wheels were raised up by the stones, and thrown from the track. Luckily, the train was not going at a rapid rate, and the engineer was enabled to stop it almost instantly, thus avoiding serious damage.

A similar attempt was made at that precise point about four weeks ago, which was frustrated by the watchfulness of the engineer, who saw the stones in time to stop the engine before reaching them. And like attempts are frequently made at different points along the line.

BY TELEGRAPH.

FOREIGN.

PARIS, 26.—The Spanish consul at Bayonne has made a demand for the extradition of deserters from the crew of the *Nieves*, seized at St. Jean de Luz by the French authorities, on representations that she had on board contraband of war for the Carlists. The *Journal de Paris* believes this demand contrary to the spirit of the treaty of 1862, because Spain would treat the crew, if surrendered, as political offenders, and in such cases all the western states of Europe, including Spain, have heretofore refused extradition.

JACMEL, 11.—Business is dull. The coffee crop is immense, but it comes slowly, the country people refusing to sell at the prevailing price, which is ten dollars.

Octavius Rameau has been commissioned plenipotentiary to the courts of England, France and Spain.

The steamer *Mary* foundered on the voyage from Glasgow to Trinidad. Ten persons sank with the ship, the remainder took to the boats, one of which with five men is supposed to have been swamped; the other, containing two of the crew living and three dead, was picked up by the steamer *Horseguard*, from Odessa, and the survivors were landed at Falmouth yesterday.

The *Daily News* states that the project of marriage between the Princess Thira of Denmark and the Crown Prince of Hanover has been abandoned.

A special from Madrid to the *Standard* reports that Admiral Topete had an attack of apoplexy on Friday, but is recovering.

BERLIN, 25.—The supreme tribunal has confirmed the decision of the lower court, rejecting the Count Von Arnim's appeal for release.

LONDON, 25.—The Spanish ambassador in London recently made representations to Lord Derby, minister of foreign affairs, that supplies of arms and other material of war, manufactured in England, were frequently shipped for the Carlists in Spain, and requested that vigilance be exercised by the British authorities to prevent such violation of neutrality. To this Lord Derby sharply replied, that an indefinite continuance of the war in Spain showed great lack of vigor and energy, and that if the Spanish navy was vigilant the landing of arms for the Carlists would be impossible.

LONDON, 26.—France and Spain have each determined to send war vessels to the river Bidasson, to prevent the crossing of supplies for the Carlists.

It is said that British subjects living in Sooloo archipelago have memorialized the home government, complaining of grievances at the hands of the Spanish who have assumed the sovereignty over those islands; Her Majesty's government will dispatch a man-of-war to inquire into the matter, and report.

VIENNA, 25.—The foreign office is informed that the difficulty in Montenegro is of small importance, growing out of frequently recurring encounters between hostile classes; the Porte promises to punish the murderers, and the trouble is considered settled.

The *Peking* left Sandy Hook on Monday, Sept. 28, at 8.45 a. m., and with the loss of her blades, as above, made the run to Rio de Janeiro in about twenty days.

NEWBURYPORT, 26.—A large fire is raging in Georgetown, Mass.; the house, stables and two shoe factories of Geo. Tenney, and the Pentucket house are nearly consumed.

LONDON, 26.—The *Times* correspondent at Bombay telegraphs that it is estimated that two thousand persons were killed in the town and district of Madinapore during the recent cyclone.

HAVANA, 22.—The *Diario* says there is no truth in the reports which have been circulated, that Captain General Concha will not

enforce the decree of July 10th, establishing a contribution of five per cent on capital; the story has been put in circulation for the purpose of raising the premium on gold as well as to injure the credit of the Government. Superior authority never recedes, no matter what may be the nature of the opposition which it meets, and it has been decided to enforce this decree with the utmost rigor, in order to prevent a paralysis of the Government, and to bring into the treasury the amount imperatively demanded for the peremptory necessities of the campaign. Concha has accepted the accounts furnished by the tax payers, but reserves the right, should it be found hereafter that their capital is greater than represented, to collect on the surplus at the rate of five per cent.
