FLOATING FRAGMENTS.

The mud is rapidly disappearing from the streets.

Supt. James Dunn, of the Provo Wash Mills, was in town today.

Prof. E. Beesley has been appointed permanent leader of the Tabernacle choir.

Today we were pleased to meet Bro. Charles W. Nibley, who is down from Logan.

An Indian killed and a squaw stabbed last night, in a whisky row near Jordan Bridge.

Nobody need go away from this part of the country to find nice weather. It could scarcely be more desirable for the season.

There is a mule on the Fort Lane reservation that is forty-seven years old. The Leader says he has killed everything but the bucket.

"Our Boarding House" will be presented at the Theatre to-night. Those who desire a genuine dramatic treat can have one by attending.

Members of the 23d Quorum of Seventy are requested to meet at the residence of Chas. Lambert, 7th Ward, on Monday evening at 7 o'clock.

The collection of licenses in Washoe county, Nevada, for the month of October, amounted to \$1,547.48, of which \$1,000 was for gaming licenses.

Frank Green, who has charge of the large reservoir of Virginia City, Nevada, Water Company, lately killed, near the reservoir, a lynx weighing 42 pounds.

The clothing store of E. Beckstead, Cheyenne, was robbed on Tuesday night of a quantity of clothing, some of which had been left for repair, and the rest belonging to the proprietor.

Comptroller Hollock, in looking over some old records, lately found an entry of the payment of a bill for the sum of \$3,416.77, to the Western Union Telegraph Company, for transmitting the Constitution of the State of Nevada to Washington, in March, 1865.

Last night, E. S. Chase, United States marshal in Idaho, arrived here from Malad, having in his custody Michael Mooney and Frank Barnes, the murderers of young Hinckley. The prisoners were taken to Boise City, Idaho, whither they depart by the west-bound train.

November 12th a fight took place in a saloon in the vicinity of Fort Maginnis, Montana, which resulted in one man being killed and three others wounded—one of them dangerously. The saloon was owned and run by a man generally known as "Buckskin Jim," who was badly hurt. Thomas Pool was killed.

The public will be heartily glad when the disgraceful squabble among the late cattle barons and physicians is sunk into blissful oblivion. The great Dr. "No Cause for Alarm"—Bliss—threatens to write his book on the subject. Just what his enemies want him to do. He is accused of uttering conspicuous inexactitudes, which is likely to be true.

Las Cruces, New Mexico, is coming to the front as a killing town. Last week at the village, one man was shot and killed, and another was severely stabbed; the foreman of a cattle gang was "held up" in broad daylight and robbed; a printer was stopped by a night footpad, and an attempt was made at robbery, but the disciple of Franklin fired his revolver at his assailant and drove him off.

Recently while Louis Kaufman and two other men were driving a herd of 45 head of cattle across the ice at Canyon Ferry, Montana, the ice gave way and precipitated the whole herd into the water. The two men were not near enough to the cattle to be engulfed with them. The current there is very swift and only nine of the animals were able to get out, the remainder being swept beneath the ice and drowned.

On Tuesday in the Nightingale mine, near Leadville, two miners, named Tinsdale and Jensen, were engaged in removing what was supposed to be a defective giant powder cartridge from the tunnel, when it exploded, hurling them a dozen feet away. Both of the men's arms were blown off, and his eyes put out. Jensen was seriously hurt. At the hospital, both of Tinsdale's eyes were taken out and his nose amputated. He will live, but is the worst used up man in Colorado.

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Regular Services.—Religious services of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints at the Salt Lake Assembly Hall, to-morrow afternoon, beginning at 2 o'clock.

Christmas Window.—The first finished Christmas window of the season that we have seen is that of Z. C. M. I. Grocery Department. It is decidedly handsome, and the result of the good taste of Brother H. W. Naisbitt and his aids, T. Olsen and C. Lenz.

Last Night's Lecture.—Last night Prof. Fowler delivered another of his highly interesting lectures, to a large audience. At the close Mr. Cameron, of the New York Store, was selected for phenological examination. The next of the series of lectures will be delivered on Monday evening.

From Montana.—Mr. Alexander Majors, a widely and favorably known western man, is down from Montana, where he has spent several months on mining business. He will go to Frisco to visit the Horn Silver mine, in which he is interested. After spending a few days there he will proceed to the East, accompanied by Mrs. Majors, and will not return till spring. Both are in good health.

Logan Temple.—We learn from Truman O. Angell, Junr., architect of the Logan Temple, that the mason work on that fine structure has been suspended for the winter, on account of unfavorable weather. He is of opinion that that branch of this work, including the pointing, will be completed next summer.

A large force of carpenters are at work on the interior, laying floors, putting in door and window frames, sash, etc.

SUDDEN DEATH.

STEPHEN POPE IS FOUND LYING DEAD OUTSIDE OF HIS HOUSE.

There has lived for a considerable time past, on the bench, in the southeast part of the Tenth Ward, a man, apparently about 60 years of age, named Stephen Pope. Being a widower and without family, he lived alone. He was in poor circumstances, and the family of Brother John Kirkman has, for some time, in a neighborly way, supplied him with milk and other necessities.

This morning, Samuel Kirkman, son of Bro. John Kirkman, proceeded to Pope's place on the usual charitable errand, and found the old man lying outside, by the corner of the house, quite dead. There was no evidence of the deceased having been injured by any violence, and it is probable that death resulted from heart disease, or some such malady. The facts, however, will be ascertained to-day, an officer having been dispatched to the spot to ascertain the position of the body and have it conveyed to the office of the City Sexton, where an inquest will be held.

AN INDIAN MURDER.

WHISKY DID IT—AN INDIAN KILLED AND A SQUAW WOUNDED.

Last night a Goshute Indian, known as Mone, called at the house of Indian interpreter Geo. W. Hill, in the 19th Ward. Mone was intoxicated, and told Brother Hill, an Indian named Jim had given him whisky. He asked that a whole-campment of Goshutes were drunk near Jordan Bridge, and that Jim had threatened to kill him. He asked if he could stop all night, to which request Brother Hill replied that he would not have a drunken Indian on his premises, and he had better leave and keep away from Jim by traveling north. This morning an old Indian called upon Brother Hill and informed him that there had been a sanguinary fight in the camp last night, that his son had been killed in the affray, and a squaw stabbed in the fleshy part of the arm, near the shoulder.

Tabernacle Choir Leadership.—We learn that at a meeting of the Tabernacle choir, held last night, the question of a permanent leadership was definitely settled. It will be remembered that at the time of the resignation of Prof. Carsons, Brother Thomas C. Griggs was selected for the post. He being in England at the time, on a mission, Brother E. Beesley occupied the position in the meantime. At the meeting last evening Brother Griggs made some very appropriate remarks, drawing attention to the manner in which the pro tem leader had conducted the choir, and expressing himself to the effect that he did not feel as if he could disturb the present arrangement by accepting of the leadership; he therefore proposed that Brother Beesley be elected permanent conductor. The proposal was carried without dissent, the best of feeling prevailing.

We congratulate Brother Beesley on his assuming the permanent leadership, and also Brother Griggs for the generous and brotherly feeling he has manifested in the matter. Both are estimable gentlemen and capable musicians, and either is amply qualified to fill the position. The Tabernacle Choir is an organization of which the community of Latter-day Saints justly feels proud.

Ward Afternoon Meetings.—A number of the Wards most distant from the central part of the city have begun to hold Sunday afternoon services in the local meeting-houses. This arrangement has been effected to give many people living in the more suburban parts of the city an opportunity of attending divine service at which they can receive the Sacrament, who are unable, owing to the distance, to attend meetings at the Assembly Hall. The wards availing themselves of the privilege of holding local afternoon meetings are, we understand: The 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th, 6th, 9th, 10th and 21st. The people of the 9th, we believe, have their meetings every alternate Sabbath, the others every Sunday.

This arrangement is satisfactory for several reasons, the Assembly Hall having frequently been uncomfortably crowded. It will doubtless continue to be filled.
