At Mill Creek, Dec. 2, 1879, of typhoid pneumonia, ALEX. BRUNKER, aged 35 years, 3 months and 23 days.

In the 15th Ward of this city, of pneumonia, Dec. 2, 1879, JOHN W., son of J. K. and Jane E. Wilson, aged 3 months and 15 days.

At Granite, Salt Lake County, November 27, 1879, ELIZABETH BOYCE, wife of John Boyce, leaving a husband and four children and many friends.

At Columbus, Platte County, Nebraska, November 24, 1879, Mr. WILLIAM DYKE, an old veteran of the Church, and one of the Pioneers that left Winter Quarters in President Young's company in 1847, aged 75 years.
