HER MINETEENTH CHILD. New York, Nov. 18.—Mrs. Marle Radieigh, 48 years old, and married 29 years, has given birth to her 19 ohild. Only nine of the children are fiving, but one of them, a daughter 19 years old, is married and the mother of one child.

The heutality of the Nicaraguan goverament in ordering the execution of these two Americans, without trial of any sort, is likely to result in this government's taking drastic measures.

President Taft was so incensed that he immediately announced that be would have no communication whatover with the new Nicaraguan minister and that official was so informed.

At the Nicaraguan legation it was stated no news of the execution had been received.
