Entire Burden of Paying for Sidewalk Extensions Placed on the Shoulders of Property Owners,

Without even a squabble the city council last night passed a resolution presented by Councilman Black order. ing the repaying and resurfacing of Main street from South Temple to Fourth South street. The city recordor was ordered to advertise for bids for a parlod of 20 days and then the a pariod of 20 days and men the tenders will be opened. It is possible that work on the improvement will begin on May 15, and that it will be finished before the Grand Army encampoient, in August.

There was only one protest against the improvement, that of Joseph Baumgarten who has 1832 feet. The total estimated cost is \$46,064.61. This is divided as follows: Abutters' portion.

vided as follows: Abutters' portion, \$33,100.94 and city's portion \$12,063.68. The cost a linear foot is \$5,348.47. The improvement includes the recurbing and guttering of the street.





# MAIL CLERK ARRESTED FOR RIFLING LETTERS

Ren Sallor of Salt Lake Behind the Bars-Caught by Means Of a Decoy.

Ren Sallor, a young man 30 years of age, who resides at 726 west North Temple street with his wife and three children, was arraigned before United States Commissioner Charles Baldwin yesterday afternoon on the charge of rifling registered mail packages on the train running between Sait Lake City and Maiad, Idano. His bonds were fixed at \$2,000, in default of which he was taken to the county fall, where he will have to remain to await the action of the grand jury, if bail is not forthoming. Sailor was arrested earlier in the day

Sailor was accested earlier in the day at Ogden by Inspectors McKee, Lowe and Nelson, who caught him with the goods. They had sent three decoy packages of registered matter containing meney to Sears, Roebuck company thicago: National Cloak House, New York and Montgomery Ward & Company, all of them being malled at Garland. When Sailors train arrived at Ogden the inspectors examined the packages sent by them, the currency in which had previously been marked, and they found that the money had been abstracted. Sailer was immediately placed under arrest, and the money was found on him. He made no attempt to deny the crime, but freely confessed that he had opened a number of letters and taken money from them, though he does not admit having taken the amount which is estimated to have been lost during the past nine or tenments. The inspectors say that during that time, as near as they can tell, several hundred dollars have been taken, but Sailor has been in the mail service on the railway for several years, but has only been on the Mallad run for about eight months. 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
