WEATHER ITEM.

The highest point reached by the thermometer to-day was 88.

CHARLEY BACKUS and KATE NEWTON. These two artists will make their first bow before a Salt Lake audience, at the theatre, to-night, and their fame as professionalists will, doubtless, have the effect of drawing a good house. It should be remembered that this talented gentleman and lady will perform here for two nights only, this and to-morrow evening. Mr. Backus is said to have no superior in his line on the boards, and Miss Newton is said to be a clever and pleasing juvenile comedienne.

The performance will commence with Robertson's comedy of "Cato," Miss Newton appearing as Rosalind. The ever humorous Phil, who has not been on the boards for the last few months, will personate Hans. The favorite character of Mr. J. W. Coggeshall will appear as Captain Hawtree, while the balance of the characters will be played by Messrs. Marlow and Dunne and Mesdames M. Bowring and Carrie Carter.

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THE HYPER SISTERS.—We had a call to-day from Mr. Graves, agent of the Hyper Sisters who will appear shortly at the theatre. According to our exchanges from places where these talented ladies have appeared, they must be really wonderful in their line. Their voices are described as combining the qualities of great compass, sweetness and power. If their performances are as rich and attractive as our newspapers say they are they will, doubtless, draw well in this city.

There is a practice, quite common among a certain class of men and boys in this city during the summer months, to which, for several reasons we wish to call attention. We allude to bathing in the waters of City Creek Canyon. This is more especially indulged in on Sunday morning, and the locality thus infested is that situated between the four and saw mill.

This practice is strongly objectionable, for several reasons. In the first place, the majority of the people in that part of the city obtain their water from City Creek. There is a city ordinance, we believe, forbidding severe penalties to be levied upon any wayfarer who uses the water for any purpose other than for drinking purposes; and if there be any way in which this can be done more advantageously than by bathing in it we are not aware of it. Now, we think that men or boys, who will go and bathe in a body of water, and then come back and drink from it, are about as indecent as it is possible to be, and deserve the heaviest punishment the law can inflict.

Another strong reason why this practice should be stopped at once and for all time, in the locality alluded to, is that it is quite so sparsely inhabited by white folks as it once was, and ladies have to pass that way or are compelled to take a circuitous route. This, we happen to know, was the case yesterday, and no doubt has often been so before.

Another, and the last reason, we shall allude to now, is that in a sanitary point of view, this practice is strongly objectionable, for nothing is more calculated to injure the health of the people, than drinking or cooking food in impure water.

We recommend the men and boys who resort to this place, for the purpose of bathing, to persevere and reflect upon these remarks. We are satisfied that if they have a very ordinary share of intelligence or decency they will at once see the propriety of desisting from their course. If there is anything in the world that should be pursued clean, it is the water a people use for drinking and cooking; and if there is anything that men or boys, having a spark of decency in their entire composition, would refrain from is doing the least thing to shock or infringe upon female modesty.

Waiting the body in cold water, is an excellent practice but to do it where we know others will be forced to drink that water is heinous; and if the unsavory is continued, it is the water a people use for drinking and cooking; and if there is anything that men or boys, having a spark of decency in their entire composition, would refrain from is doing the least thing to shock or infringe upon female modesty.

INFORMATION WANTED.

The following is from the Territorial Enterprise, published at Virginia City, Nevada:

The American Consul at Bradford, Yorkshire, England, writes to United States Consul at Salt Lake City, Utah, to learn the present whereabouts of William Tempest, who was in Hamilton, White Pine, when last heard from, which was March 9, 1870. He came to this State in 1869 from California, with one William Ward, with whom he worked in a mine called the "Enterprise" and in 1870 the two worked in a mine known as the "Lone Star," in which Tempest was an owner. Young Tempest was known among the miners by the nickname of "Rustler." His father, a respectable wool merchant of Bradford, fears that he has been taken sick and died or that he has been foully dealt with. AN ORDINANCE IN RELATION TO QUARANTINE.

Sec. 1. Be it ordained by the City Council of Salt Lake City, that said City and all that district of country embraced within twelve miles of the outer limits thereof, be, and the same are hereby declared subject to quarantine regulations.

Sec. 2. The City Council shall appoint one or more quarantine physicians, each of whom, before entering upon the duties of his office, shall take and subscribe an oath, and give bonds in the penal sum of five thousand dollars, conditioned for the faithful performance thereof, who, associated with the Mayor, shall constitute a Board of Quarantine, and whose duty it shall be to make and enforce quarantine regulations within the above described quarantine limits.

Sec. 3. That if any person or persons shall be found in an unhealthy condition from any contagious disease, within the aforesaid quarantine limits, they shall, if in the judgment of said Board of Quarantine the safety of the person so infected, or the public, shall render such action necessary, be required to remove from such place, within said limits as said Board may direct; and if any such person shall neglect or refuse to comply therewith, it shall be the duty of said Board to have it done at the expense of said person; and if in the judgment of said Board, it shall be deemed advisable for the person so infected to remain in his usual place of abode for care and treatment, the said Board shall compel the strict quarantine of said place of abode, by causing to be kept displayed conspicuously during the period of danger, a yellow flag upon such premises, as well as by establishing a guard at, or near the same; by giving notice in the most public manner practicable that said premises are infected; and, further, by regulating and prohibiting ingress and egress to and from said premises, until all danger from infection therein shall have ceased, and the most thorough measures for disinfecting said premises shall have been taken. And if the effects of any person be found in a condition liable to endanger contagious disease, the same shall, at the discretion of the quarantine physician, be removed or destroyed at the expense of the owner thereof, and in the event of the removal of any person so infected, the premises from which he is removed, shall be quarantined until all danger of infection shall have passed; and such measures for the purification of said premises shall be taken, in the judgment of the quarantine physician, as shall be necessary.

Sec. 4. The names of all quarantine physicians shall be published in some newspaper printed in Salt Lake City, during the continuance of the contagion, and physicians or other persons having any knowledge of the existence of any malignant contagious disease, or having reason to believe any such disease exists, are hereby required to report the same forthwith to a quarantine physician; and physicians, nurses, or any other persons, who have been, or shall be exposed to such contagious disease, are hereby forbidden to mingle with, or be in the presence of, others, subject to the contagion, in such clothing as may have been used where there was such disease, or otherwise expose any person to such contagion.

Sec. 5. Any person neglecting or refusing to comply with the above requirements, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars, or be imprisoned not to exceed six months, or both time and imprisonment.

Sec. 6. That an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance regulating Quarantine," passed March 12th, 1860, and an ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance in relation to Quarantine," passed July 28th, 1871, be, and the same are hereby repealed.
