

NEW ORDINANCES FOR PAVING WORK

Macadamizing Sidewalks and Sewers Along a Number of Streets.

HEARD PEOPLE'S PROTEST.

Contention Between Superior Addition Residents and Salt Lake & Ogden Railroad Company.

Another long and tiresome meeting of the city council was held last night during which a large number of ordinances were passed providing for paving, macadamizing, sidewalks and sewers along a number of streets of the city.

SENATOR BAMBERGER HEARD.

The principal contention before the council last night was the controversy between the residents of Superior addition in North Salt Lake and the Salt Lake & Ogden railroad over the matter of a schedule for the people of that district.

A Mr. Halverson appeared before the council in behalf of the residents of that district and stated that he had agreed with Mr. Bamberger as to the schedule printed, but that it was not satisfactory to a number of others out there.

MATTER GOES BACK.

Fernstrom urged the adoption of the committee report, which recommended that the company be compelled to comply with the terms of its franchise in regard to the matter of service for the Superior people.

NEW ORDINANCES PASSED.

An ordinance confirming the assessment upon the property on both sides of Second street from the west side of Canyon road to the west side of West street, and on both sides of C street from the north side of South Temple street to the south side of Second street.

An ordinance levying a tax upon the property abutting on both sides of West Fourth street from the north side of Fifth street to the south side of Fifth street, for the purpose of providing for grading, gutters and curbing and paving thereof.

An ordinance levying a tax for the assessment of property on the south side of Fourth street between First and Second West streets, in sewer district No. 2, for the construction of a sewer.

An ordinance levying a tax and for the assessment of property on both sides of Fourth street between First and Second West streets, in sewer district No. 2, for the construction of a sewer.

An ordinance confirming the assessment upon the property on the south side of Fifth South street between Second West and Eighth West streets, and on the north side of Fifth South street between Second West and Eighth West streets, in sidewalk districts No. 2, 3 and 4, for the construction of concrete sidewalks.

NEW FIRE STATION.

The new fire station in the southeastern part of the city will probably be built this season, as the contract with O. Chayras for its construction at a cost of \$5,000 was approved by the council last night.

The most bill for the isolation hospital, which has been held up for consideration for some time, was approved by the council. The bill was for \$10,000 for meat between April 2 and April 3.

J-STREET IMPROVEMENTS.

The proposed improvements on J street have been postponed for the present and until the property owners come to let the city straighten out the knot where the property line is encroaching upon the sidewalk.

The amended police department ordinance by Crabtree which increases the salaries of the mounted police and city sergeants from \$90 to \$100 per month was passed by the council.

OLD JUDGMENT PAID.

On recommendation of the council a committee the council approved \$1,148.22 for the payment of the judgment secured against the city by Joseph S. Blom and Co., former contractor on sidewalks constructed in the city.

The board of public works submitted the appointment of J. H. Rives as chief inspector on the Ogden road, which has been removed. The appointment was confirmed.

RECEIPTS FROM COURT.

City Recorder Mevion reported the receipts of the criminal division of the city court for the month of May to be \$1,629, the civil division \$174, and the juvenile court \$2. The above amounts together with the receipts from franchise, automobile licenses, etc., making a total of \$2,255.85, have been turned over to the treasurer.
