LOCAL BRIEFS.

Carpenter Had Bad Fall—William Noyce, a carpenter, fell from a ladder yesterday afternoon, and broke his leg below the knee.

Sad News Received—Mrs. W. G. Lamb has received the sad intelligence last evening, of the death of her mother in Boston of heart failure.

Evangelistic Meetings—The evangelistic meetings in the Central Christian church will continue through next week. There have been a number of conversions during the past week.

Cedar Improvements—Architect Dallas has completed plans for improvements in the State Normal school buildings at Cedar, valued at \$4,000.

Mr. Dale Improving—The friends of W. H. Dale will be pleased to learn that his condition, which is described as being quite serious in the "News" New York letter in another column, has considerably improved since the letter was written.

Corner For Art Institute—The state fair directors have assigned the northwest corner of the downtown of Commerce to the Art Institute for permanent occupancy, where such art displays as it may see fit to make may be exhibited.

Applied For Water—E. A. Thompson, D. S. Gillies and H. D. Wiley of Circleville filed application yesterday afternoon, with the state engineer, for 100 second feet of water from the river in Garfield county, for power and lighting in Garfield, Plate and Sevier counties.

Mountains On Cover—The Rocky Mountain Bell Telephone company published today, a new directory. A special feature is the chromolithograph as a frontispiece of Culmer's painting of the Teton basin. It is a work of art and embellished with the somewhat familiar legend of "See America First."

Miss Wood Not Dead—Miss Topsy Wood who left this city a week ago for Glenwood Springs, denies her suicide which was reported in Salt Lake; and also denies that she intended to elope with a Montrose man. Miss Wood, is really Mrs. Annie Endrick whose husband was killed in 1897, it was alleged in self-defense by a man named Brower.

Four Double Track Curves—The Utah Light and Railway company management is considering plans for laying four double track curves, the coming spring, at the intersection of Main and First South, and Main and Second South streets. This will take care of heavy interurban traffic through the central part of the city that is sure to come in the not distant future.

Three Lots Sold—The Western Moline Plow company has bought from the Cleveland Commission company for \$7,000, three lots at the rear of 330 south Third West street, where the plow people will erect a five story business building. They will occupy the building themselves. The value of the improvement will be \$100,000. The value of the lots two years ago was \$2,000.

Clearing House Statement—Bradstreet's clearing house statement for the week ending last Thursday evening showed Salt Lake the thirty-fourth in the list of cities in the United States, with clearings at \$5,878,728, an increase of 22.7 per cent. The heaviest increase was at Greensburg, Pa., 108.9 per cent. Seattle comes next, 64.3 per cent. The clearings in New York amounted to over \$2,000,000,000.

Frederickson laid the blame to leaves on the track which wouldn't allow the brakes to work properly, and let his car run off onto Seventh South street where the other was waiting.
