Well Known Physician Dies at Holy Cross Hospital.

DR. M'ACHRAN.

A MOST CHARITABLE MAN.

Had Suffered for Months from Locos motor Ataxia-Was Particularly Attached to Children.

Dr. John J. McAchran died last evening at the Holy Cross hospital of locomotor ataxia from which he had been suffering for several months. When he received his first attack he went to St. Mark's hospital where he was treated for several weeks. He recovered sufficient strength to be up and around again, but not the same light spirit and activity that had characterized him in the past. He again gradually wasted away, and in sheer weakness sank down upon his bed jast Saturday never to rise again in mortal life. He was alone in his room in the Hooper block nearly twenty-four hours before he was discovered. When he before he was discovered. When he was found out his friends did all they could to assist him, yet they felt instinctively that death had put its mark upon him. For nearly three days prior to his death, he was in a sort of coma-tose state from which he never railied Dr. McAchran was born in the State of Kentucky 44 years ago. He was a splendld type of the Southern gentleman, possessing the elements of gener-osity that has endeared him to scores of children, as well as elder folks, in this city and State.

He graduated high in his class from the medical university of his native State, and moved to Denver in 1887. From there he went to Cheyenne, and n 1889 he came to Salt Lake where he soon found place in the hearts and con-fidence of the people. Several years ago he lost his mother, a blow which seemed to turn the current of his life, as he was very much devoted to her. He took her body ar the old home, but when he returned, it

was as though a stranger had come back. He seemed to be preoccupied with some grief, and the watchful eyes of his nearest friends marked his

Dr. McAchran was a man who loved his fellow beings, and he followed his profession as much for the satisfaction that it gave his benevolent heart, as for the means of livelihood it obtained him. When he received a call, he never asked what are the prospects of a big fee, or of a fee at all. It was enough for him to know that a sick creature had asked for his help, and he never withheld his aid whenever or wher-ever it was needed, whether he was compensated or not. Children were paralways kind and tender with them, and if there comes to the soul that has passed into the great beyond, a satisfaction when the eyes of children fill arn of the demise of then surely the kindly soul of Dr. chran will be filled with satisfaction He was a member of Lodge No. 14 A. O. U. W., in this city, and a Mason in his native town, but he did not affiliate with the Masons here. He has a cousin, Robert W. Gaddie, living here who is in the employ of the Wells-Fargo Express company. He has a number of relatives at Mendflerdsville, Kentucky, who have been wired as to the disposition to the remains. Pending word from them the body will be the care of Undertaker Watson. Dr. McAchran carried about \$9,000 incur one policy in the Royal Union of Omaha and \$2,000 in the A. O. U. W.

WATER FROM UTAH LAKE.

Board of Public Works to Advertise for Dredging Bids.

City Council Gives Instructions - Saritary Committee Authorized to Investigate Cost of Crematory.

Councilman Robertson at last evening's meeting of the city solons offered a resolution instructing the board of public works to advertise for bids for the work of dredging the Jordan river, from Utah lake to the upper dam, for the purpose of lowering the bed of the river so as to increase the supply of the lake and also to preserve the right acquired by the city, under its appropriation some six months ago. The members concluded that in view of the fact of the city having no dredging apparatus it would be cheaper, to say nothing of being better, to do the work by contract. Seventeen teams and scrapers are already at work cutting a channel where that is necessary. The resolution was adopted unanimously, THE COMMITTEE'S ADDRESS.
