UTAH SHEEP LEVIED ON.

Assessor Goes With a Sheriff and Demands Taxes and License.

The following is from the White Pine News of Ely, Nevada:

As the result of their trip to the eastern part of the county last week, Assessor Williamson and Sheriff Newman have a band of sheep numbering about 5,000 in charge on Mount Moriah, about twenty miles distant from L. Smithson's ranch, they having found that neither taxes nor license had been paid on the animals as pro-

The sheep are the property of the Deep Creek Farm & Livestock com-pauy of Utah, of which organization V. Taylor of Salt Lake City is the general manager, and when the officers demanded the money due for taxes and license they were simply ignored by those in charge. Including lambs, the herd numbers about 5,000 and Assessor Williamson levied on 1,000 of the sheep for the taxes due, the sale of which will take place tolay to satisfy the demand, if settlement is not made.

Sheriff Newman came to town on Tuesday and made complaint before Judge W. H. Tyler, as a result of which an attachment was issued against the sheep, and also a warrant for the ariest of A. V. Taylor on the charge of ranging sheep within this county without first securing a license. Armed with these documents the sheriff returned to the sheep camp yesterday, where Assessor Williamson mained in charge of the property, and it is allogether probable there will be sacrifice sale of sheep in Snake Val-

ley today. overal Manager Taylor is expected at the sheep camp hourly, and on his arrival Sheriff Newman will broing hin, to Ely as the guest of White Pine county.

Elder Mathoniah Thomas followed in very earnest address. He said that it had been asserted that the young men in the Church were becom-ing indifferent about their faith, sincere than ever before.
