Line Well Patronized on Opening Day—Cars Will Run Every Thirty Minutes.

HORSE RACES FOR FOURTH.

Campbell Pleads Guilty—Efforts to Settle Difference of Street Railway Men and Employers.

Ogden, July 2.—The Ogden canyon street car route was well patronized yesterday, its opening day, hundreds availing themselves of the easy access to the beautiful canyon scenery and the Sanitarium. The company has fully decided to run the cars every half hour, leaving the Broom hotel corner. One car will make the run, being able to make the round trip in 30 minutes.

DISTRESSING ACCIDENT.

John Roberts Runs Into Hay Rake With Disastrous Effect.

Ogden, July 2.—John Roberts, a young man who resides on Twelfth street, met with painful injuries late Saturday night by running into a hay rake, almost tearing his nose from his face. He was riding along Washington avenue on his bicycle at a good rate of speed. A hay rake had been left out in the wagon road in front of Peter shape's blacksmith shop, near Twenty-sixth street. It being quite dark, Roberts did not observe the rake, and ran into it with his wheel, which threw him with considerable force against the iron on the rake, which tore the lower portion of his nose entirely loose. The wound was very painful and bled profusely. He went to the office of Dr. Rich and Osgood, where the injury was temporarily dressed and several stitches put in to hold the nose in place, until yesterday, when the injury was properly cared for. It required 14 stitches to get the nose into proper shape, and it will take some time for the wound to heal up. The physicians hope the nose will not be deformed, but that is very uncertain.

CAMPBELL PLEADS GUILTY.

Will be Sentenced Tuesday for Hold-up at Reed Hotel.

Ogden, July 2.—Harry Campbell, realizing that his identity was certain when he had up five men in the office of the Reed hotel about a month ago, waived preliminary examination and appeared before Judge Howell in the district court to answer to the charge, he entered a plea of guilty, thus saving the state the expense of prosecuting the case against him, and will appear tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock for sentence. He appears to have repented of his criminal act and expects to go to the state prison with a determination to live a better life when he gets out. It is believed this is the first serious trouble he has ever been in.

GRAZING RATE FOR SHEEP ON RESERVES.

(Special to the "News.")

Cheyenne, Wyo., July 1.—Word has been received at the headquarters of the National Woolgrowers' association in this city of a change in the regulations of the forestry bureau of the department of agriculture governing the grazing of sheep in the reserves of Wyoming, Colorado, Montana, Utah and other states. The change abolishes the present system heretofore in use, and under which system lambs under six months of age were counted. Hereafter there will be made of lambs under six months of age and the charges will be made on a basis of head counting the head stock. The minimum price for grazing sheep will be kept at 2 cents per head, at least for the present.

The chief forester, in a letter to the National Woolgrowers' association, announced that other changes will be made that will benefit the sheep and woolgrowers. "It will be our aim," writes the chief forester, "to readjust the charges for grazing sheep on an equitable basis lowering the rate in localities where it appears too high and raising it in localities where the advantages warrant it. I assure you it will be our aim to make the rates comparatively equitable in all cases and hope we will be able to adjust this matter to the satisfaction of the sheepmen."

The action of the forestry bureau as the result of protests from the sheepmen using the San Juan and Cochetopa forest reserves in Colorado. These protests were presented to the National Woolgrowers' association, and by it referred to the chief forester. Complaints of inequitable regulations on other reserves have been received and in due time the Woolgrowers' association hope to secure the needed concessions.

GOING DOWN TO SANDY.

Boosters Excursion on Wednesday to Help Home Industries Along.

Wednesday another of those jolly booster excursions, which have been run out of Salt Lake at intervals this year, is scheduled. It is in the nature of a second trip to Sandy, where the boosters went last spring, and listened to the needs of the south end of Salt Lake county. At that time the cry for electric lights and street cars was very loud, and when called on to speak a booster, who was also an official of the Utah Light & Power company, arose in meeting and peddled the lighting service at once. Wiring has been installed since then and the service will receive its first trial on the night of the Fourth of July. In honor of the event the Salt Lake Merchants and Manufacturers' association has accepted an invitation from the Jordan Commercial and Producers' association to help celebrate the Fourth.

Gordon H. Place, who has been manager of the association since it was organized, presided at the meeting at the hotel, and was accepted of the board of directors, and it was accepted, at the request of Mr. Place. The reason for taking the step is that Mr. Place has decided to go into a certain line of business for himself, after becoming educated on Utah opportunities, and regret was expressed by the board in accepting his resignation. Orvin Morris, traffic manager of the association will temporarily assume charge of the office.
