LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS. Club Re-union. -Emportance of the re-union of the Salt Lake Club, last night. The company, as large and all seemed to enjoy themselves.

Religious Services. -Religious services to-morrow afternoon and evening, commencing at two and six o'clock, at all the ward meeting houses, excepting the 17th.

Preaching. -Elders Moses Thatcher and William B. Preston, of Logan, are expected to preach at the 18th ward meeting house to-morrow evening.

Fit for Attention. -To-morrow evening, Jan. 24, at 7.30, there will be a special meeting of the Salt Lake City Brigade, at which business of importance is to be transacted. R. H. HARDY, Secretary.

Shiloh. -We received a call from Brother Daniel Graves to-day. He lectures on "Shiloh" in American Fork on Thursday, and will do the same in Farmington to-night.

Board Over. -The examination of the Hot Wing, who shot and wounded another Chinaman, at Alta, was concluded yesterday afternoon. Justice Pyper held him in \$1000 bonds, to answer to the grand jury.

Complimentary Benefit. -The United Club and other excellent societies of this city have tendered to Mr. Henry Gardner a complimentary benefit, to take place at the 15th Ward Assembly Room on Tuesday evening, Jan. 23d. The entertainment will consist of songs, glee, quartets, catches, recitations, &c. The Glee Club alone is sufficient attraction to draw a large audience, and besides that fine body of singers a number of the most favorite vocalists will perform. Prof. C. J. Thomas will direct the entertainment and Mr. H. E. Giles is the accompanist.

Mon. -Brother Robert G. Barrett, while traveling in Wiltshire, England, made a purchase of an old Roman coin for the Deseret Museum. Yesterday he donated it and its recent history, which leaves no doubt as to its genuineness. It bears the impress of Constantine, who is said to have been born at York, in 274. This emperor had the credit of establishing Christianity as the religion of the Roman empire, soon after A. D. 312, when his conversion took place. A number of Roman coins were obtained at Canterbury, England, by Brother K. H. Felt, of this city, while on a mission there. These, and some exchanges made, some coins of the Empire collected by Brother O. F. Dux, formerly of Copenhagen, the cabinets of the museum are becoming exceedingly interesting and valuable. A coin presented by Brother Barrett was dug up near Westbury, Wiltshire, in the neighborhood of the celebrated "Wiltshire Hoop," a fact which can be seen for miles around. The entire year is named for Roman, Saxon and Danish antiquities, is well known to many of our people, and is historically connected with the site of the ancient battle fields of the Great, against the Danes.

LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY

January 23d. (H. F. No. 8) Providing for the Registration of Voters, and to Regulate the Manner of Conducting Elections in this Territory; read the first time and ordered printed.

January 23d. Council met pursuant to adjournment. Roll called, quorum present. Prayer by the chaplain. Councilor Harrington, to whom was referred (C. F. 3) "A bill concerning divorce," reported the same back amended, and recommended its passage as amended. Report accepted, amendments read, and bill taken up on its second reading by sections, which reading was in progress when we went to press.

January 23d. House met pursuant to adjournment. Roll called quorum present. Prayer by the Chaplain. The financial reports for Sawyer and Sanpete counties, for the years 1876-7, were presented and referred. Mr. Spencer presented a bill (H. F. No. 9) entitled "A Bill to Organize Irrigating, Mining and Manufacturing Districts;" read the first time, and

On motion of Mr. Hatch, referred to the committee on irrigation and canals. Mr. Farr, chairman of the committee on judiciary, reported back (C. F. No. 4, with amendments; amendments read.

Primary Meetings. -Remember the primary meetings on Monday evening, at seven o'clock, for the election of delegates to the Municipal Convention. First Municipal Ward-Primary at the 9th Ward school-house. Second-Primary at the County Court House. Third-Primary at the 15th District school-house. Fourth-Primary at the 20th Ward school-house. Fifth-Primary at the City Hall.

St. George Temple. -A large amount of work for the dead has been done in the St. George Temple, as the following figures will show: Baptisms, 29,251; endowments, 13,192; ordinations, High Priests, 7, Elders 5,095; marriages, sealings, 4,101; sealings of children to parents, 238; adoptions, 20; besides other ordinances for the dead. The administrations to the living during the past year have been comparatively extensive.

Annual Conference. -We are in receipt of a letter from Elder David Milne, from which we learn that the Annual Conference of the spotless Mission was held at Glasgow on the 20th of December. The average attendance at the meetings was about one hundred. The missionaries from Utah present were President A. F. Macdonald, Elders Aurelius Miner, Daniel S. Macfarlane, George Meldrum, Andrew Watson, J. Allan, Aaron F. Macdonald, and David Milne. The long distance of his field of labor from Glasgow and the inclemency of the weather prevented Elder A. F. Macdonald, Jr., from attending. He labors in Rossshire, in the north-western part of Scotland. The teachings given by the brethren were of an inspiring and encouraging character. Elder Milne states that comparatively few people are being baptized, yet the Elders have much to console them in their labors. He represents society generally as being in a woefully demoralized condition.

Drowned. -At Millville, Cache County, about 4 o'clock on Wednesday afternoon, the 23d inst., Henry Griffin went to the water ditch for a bucket of water, and his mother went a little while after to her daughter's, Mrs. King, and asked her if she would go and see if anything had happened to Henry. Mrs. King and her sister Susan went to the ditch, where they found him lying upon his face in the water quite dead.

Deceased was 35 years of age, and from his youth had been subject to fits, many times barely escaping death from scalding and fire. He had for a number of years been of sound mind, but able to attend to little chores such as he was engaged in when he came to his death. The water was only about three inches deep.

The funeral services took place at the residence of Mrs. Griffin, where appropriate addresses were delivered by Bishop Pitkin and Elders John King and Charles C. Shaw. Much sympathy is felt for Mrs. Griffin in her bereavement.

Good. -The performances by the pupils of Prof. T. B. Lewis' school in the 20th Ward, last evening, were excellent. The audience was large, the hall being filled. A "Visitor hands us the following in relation to the entertainment: Professor T. B. Lewis with his pleasant entertainments, and, considering the inclemency of the weather, had a very good school audience. The exercises consisted of singing, recitations, dialogues, etc., in which the children displayed considerable talent, and reflected much credit on their teachers. But the gem of the evening was the closing piece, entitled "Cinderella," in which Miss A. Sansom, as Cinderella, and the Misses A. Savage and E. Young as the haughty sisters, and in fact all connected with it, acquitted themselves very creditably, and would have graded a stage of much larger proportions.

Much credit is due Prof. Lewis for the manner in which his school is conducted and the training of the children, as testified by his pupils and their parents generally. The means obtained at these exhibitions is used for the benefit of the children in procuring maps, instruments, etc., making the school appointments more complete.
