ORGANIZING STRIKES.

Justice Jenks of N. Y. Supreme Court Says Injunction Doesn't Lie

New York, Dec. 16.—Justice Jenks of the appellate division of the New York state supreme court handed down a decision today that an injunction against organizing a strike cannot stand. He modified an injunction to prevent a strike which had been issued by Justice Dickey of the supreme court in a suit brought by William M. Mills, William Kiesen and other employees against the United States Printing company of Ohio, the International Stereotypers and the Electrotypers' union and the New York Stereotypers' union in which the plaintiffs asked the court to prevent the union from striking to force the printing companies to discharge the non-union men.

The court held that it could not enjoin the strike and that the "picketing" which consisted only of stationing men for observation without molestation would be lawful. Justice Jenks says in his decision that picketing may also mean stationing men to coerce or threaten or intimidate or bait or turn aside a strikers will others who desire to go into the picketed place where they wished to work. In that case picketing is unlawful.

Greeted Gen. Kauibars.

Mukden, Dec. 16.—Upon the arrival of Gen. Kauibars, commander of the Russian third army here from Harbin, he was greeted by a band of music, and by Gen. Sakharoff and Biderling. He made a brief speech, conveying the emperor's greetings. Gen. Kauibars then continued his journey to Chamsamutun, where he had a conference with Gen. Kurupin.

A brief communique is progressing along the center. The Japanese are supplying the Chinese troops in the neighborhood of Bismuntin with artillery. They have already delivered 90 Krupp guns.
