

menced to remove the buildings and trees from the land, and Slade commenced an action against them for conversion, which is now pending. The inquest was continued till today, and Deputy Marshal Fowler and Sheriff Brown this morning started for Lake Shore with the expectation of making some arrests of suspected parties.

Another rumor says that the man who is killed is Hanson. It is difficult to obtain any exact information on the subject, as the officers positively refuse to say anything in regard to the matter, apparently laboring under the belief that the murderer will try to escape if the particulars, so far as known, are given to the public.

Wm. Cabel, or Wm. H. Cabel, was brought over from Spanish Fork yesterday for examination as to his sanity. He has been in Spanish Fork about two months and in Utah two years, coming here from Colorado. Cabel is about 56 years of age and was born in New York, which state he left twenty-five years ago and, he says, has a wife now living. Last Saturday evening he became violent and began to pelt the people around Rockhill's saloon at Spanish Fork with rocks and beer bottles. (It was then thought he was drunk, but as he commenced assaulting the citizens yesterday morning when he was let out of jail, the officers concluded to bring him to Provo. The examination was continued for one week during which time he will be held in the county jail and treated by County Physician Allen.

The motion of Judge Sutherland before the Jordan dam commission yesterday asking that the findings in regard to violation of contract be particularized, was denied. Thereupon Judge Sutherland asked for a continuance for two weeks, which was granted, by consent of the attorneys representing the Utah county people.

This morning Deputy Marshal Fowler returned from Lehi, where he has been aiding in the investigation set on foot to discover the perpetrator of the murder of Harry Hays, or Hanson, whose body was found on Utah lake near Pelican Point, Monday evening. The murdered man, whose name is Hanson, is a stepson of Albert Hays, of Eureka, and has been living on a ranch near Pelican Point for several years. He had not been seen for about a month previous to the time his body was discovered. His mother, Mrs. Hays, learned about three weeks ago that the stock on her son's ranch was not being attended to and went from Eureka to investigate; when she arrived there she found the animals starving, and no one appeared to have been around the place for some time. She let the cattle and horses out and returned to Eureka without instituting any search for her son. This can only be explained by stating that he was of rather an eccentric and disagreeable deportment, and she concluded that he had become angry at something or somebody and had left the ranch to return when his humor was better.

The mystery is deepened from the fact that two young men from Lake Shore, cousins of the deceased, are also missing, together with their team. They left for Hanson's ranch at about the time he is supposed to have disap-

peared, and their relatives supposed they were still there, and were greatly surprised when it was learned they were missing. The coat, hat and one shoe belonging to one of these boys was found in Hanson's cabin. The theory of the officers is that all three of the men have been murdered. It is thought that Hanson was killed first and that the others were put out of the way in order to prevent their making the discovery of his death, and raising an excitement that would lead to the identification of the murderer. In conformity with this theory the lake will be dragged near the place where Hanson's body was found.

Oliver A. Slade, the man who has had a land dispute with Hansen and Hays, is not suspected by the officers. He is now in Lehi.

County Prosecuting Attorney Gash and Assistant U. S. Attorney Wedgwood went to Lehi this morning for the purpose of taking part in the examination of witnesses before Coroner Berg.

Hanson's body which was in a badly decomposed condition, was taken to Benjamin last evening for interment.

Work is now being pushed on the extension of the water mains to the cemetery. The citizens are doing the trenching and the pipe has been bought by the city council with money collected in advance from parties who will use the waters on their lots.

"TEMPLE CITY" NEWS.

Several parties are prospecting for coal near Petersboro, with, it is reported, fair surface indications.

There is a fair prospect of a compromise in the *Nation* case, and that publication may soon be resumed.

The Sunday afternoon meetings in the various wards have been discontinued, and meetings of all the wards have been resumed in the tabernacle.

A fine of \$50 each was imposed on the four young men from Providence who were found guilty of killing fish by the use of giant powder. An appeal was taken and bonds given.

An old gentleman who was paying more attention to objects on the side of the street than to the road on which he was traveling, was thrown from his buggy by a collision with an electric light pole on Saturday. The shafts of the buggy were broken and the old gentleman's head was bruised.

The meeting of the Logan wheel club for the election of officers resulted in the election of George F. Thatcher, president, C. E. Montgomery, vice president, and Captain and R. B. Smith, secretary and treasurer. A fine club room has been rented and is being furnished. Bicycling is more popular than ever.

A bolt dropped out of one of the shafts of a buggy, allowing it to fall

down on the horse's legs, and caused a runaway. Wm. Brangham Jr., the driver, fell between the buggy bed and wheel and was dragged for some distance. His left ear was torn nearly off and he was badly bruised. His companion, Jacob West, was thrown out on his head when the vehicle ran against a telephone pole, and was nearly stunned.

The Palace Hotel was sold at Sheriff's sale last Saturday as the property of the Murdock Block Co., at the suit of Katoren Nelson. The lady bid in the property, which is worth at a moderate estimate \$25,000 for \$9,400. The trouble has been that the original builder and subsequent owners were too heavily involved at the start, and it took a fair income to pay interest on the debt. If properly handled there is no doubt it would be a paying investment, as the building is a fine three-story brick with all modern improvements.

It was a matter of much regret to the members of the delegates from Cache county on the occasion of the visit of the Convention to Logan on Saturday last, that through a blunder the representatives of the Salt Lake papers were excluded from the hall in which the banquet was held, and were therefore unable to report the speeches made by Governor West, Delegate Squires and Prof. Paul. Mr. Squires presented the College with a handsome group picture of the delegates and made a speech eulogistic of the college. The governor's speech was also highly commendatory of that institution and the rapid progress that had been made. Ample apologies were tendered to and accepted by the newspaper men, for the unintentional affront that had been placed upon them, and they afterward dined at the Hanks hotel, as the guests of Prof. Kerr, of the B. Y. College.
