She let the cattle and horses Eureka returned to netituting aby out and without instituting search for her son. This can only be ex-plained by stating that he was of rather an eccentric and disagreeable deportment, and she concluded that he had became angry at something or some-hody and had left the ranch to return when his humor was better.

The mystery is deepened from the fact that two young men from Lake Shore, cousins of the deceased, are also missing, together with their team.
