

TEMPORARY GRADE.

The same official presented a profile of the proposed temporary grade of the Great Salt Lake and Hot Springs railway. Adopted.

COST OF MAINTENANCE.

The same official presented his report for the quarter ending March 31st, 1892. It shows the expenditures to be \$5,584.45, the receipts \$395.55, making the net expenses, \$5,188.00. Adopted.

SIDEWALK PAVEMENT.

The same official reported on the petition of E. B. Wickes et al., relative to sidewalk pavement on East Temple Street, at the corner of Third South, that while it was constructed to constructed so as to conform exactly to the grade it will answer the present requirements. Adopted.

The city auditor submitted a statement showing the probable cost of the departments for the quarter ending June 30th. It is as follows:

MORE PIPE WANTED.

Superintendent of Waterworks Ryan reported that before the water could be drawn from Parley's canyon conduit into the lower system it would be necessary to lay eleven blocks of sixteen inch pipe and two blocks of eight inch pipe. It was necessary, that official said, that the work be done by June 1st. He said he also needed thirty-five tons of eight inch pipe for the north bench high line system.

NUISANCE CASE FEES.

G. Taylor sent in a bill for three days' as a witness in the Third District court in the Showell-Bingham nuisance case.

A FARMER'S PROTEST.

Edwin Rushton asked that no action towards opening a street through his farm be taken.

WATERMAIN EXTENSIONS.

The city recorder reported that the list of plate pertaining to local assessments for extension of watermain on First North between Fourth West to midway between Seventh and Eighth West; on Fifth South from midway between Fourth and Fifth West streets, had been published according to law.

The same officer reported that notices of intention to extend watermain on the following streets had been published according to law:

From intersection of West Temple and Third South to intersection of First West and Third South streets; from midway between Fifth and Sixth South streets north 250 feet on Ninth East street; from Fifth to Seventh South on Eighth West street, and along Fern street as petitioned for:

MORE MONEY FOR THE FIREMEN.

A lengthy communication from the committee on fire department, recommending the increase of salaries for the firemen amounting to \$375 a year, was read and adopted on a vote of 9 to 8.

MUST BE VERIFIED.

The bill of D. W. Rensch for work done on the surplus canal was returned for verification by the watermaster.

The bill of E. A. Adkin & Son for work done at the city cemetery was returned for the same action.

A DITCH TO BE DUG.

The committee on irrigation recommended that a ditch be dug along the east side of the Denver & Rio Grand track, and the water turned in the same. Adopted.

PLAT ACCEPTED.

The plat of Granite subdivision was accepted, providing the owner makes Ohio avenue a 66 foot street. American avenue is to be 58 feet wide.

STREET MATTERS.

The committee on streets recommended that the street supervisor inspect all the streets within the limits of the city and report such as need repairs to the Council, and to furnish the cost of the same.

The street committee recommended that Second East street be brought to a permanent grade and macadamized or otherwise permanently improved, as soon as the property owners signify their willingness to pay their proportion of the expense. Adopted.

SIDEWALK GRADES.

The city engineer submitted profiles showing sidewalk grade on Tenth East from Eighth to Ninth South; Margaret street, from Eighth to Ninth South; Eleventh East, from Eighth to Ninth South; Twelfth East, from Eighth to Ninth South; Eighth South, from Tenth East to reservation; Sunnyside avenue, from Margaret street to reservation; Ninth South, from Tenth East to reservation. Adopted.

TO SLAUGHTER THE DOGS.

The committee on police recommended that the dog tax collector be made deputy city marshal, with instructions to collar all unregistered dogs, keep them for twenty-four hours, and then dispose of all the canines not claimed; this to be done with expense to the city. Adopted.

CANNOT TAKE WATER.

The petition of Joseph Muir to be allowed to tap the Jordan and Salt Lake canal for the purpose of obtaining water for sprinkling purposes was denied, as enough water can be obtained from the irrigation ditch.

SALARY SCHEDULE.

The finance committee submitted the following report:

We, your committee on cost of maintaining a number of permanent employees, in the several municipal departments, beg leave to report as follows:

City Auditor's Department—Auditor at \$1800 per year.

City Recorder's Department—One Recorder, \$2400 per year; one deputy \$1200 per year; one clerk, \$1000 per year; one clerk, \$75 per month; one typewriter, \$600 per year; total, five employees at \$6100 per year, or \$508.33 1-3 per month.

City Treasurer's Department—One Treasurer, \$2400 per year; one deputy, \$1500 per year; one license man, \$1000 per

year; total, three men at \$4900 per year, or \$408.33 1-3 per month.

Sewer Department—One superintendent at \$2000 per year; one engineer at pump, \$1200 per year; one assistant engineer (night man), \$725 per year; one clerk, \$780 per year; three men and teams, \$1716 per year; one foreman, \$936 per year; one pipe gauger, \$780 per year; total, nine men, \$5140 per year, or \$678.33 1-4 per month.

Laborers receive \$12 per week, or \$2 per day. There are often more than one foreman and pipe gauger employed, and sometimes there are none employed; therefore they are not properly permanent employees. This will show still, probably under rather than over, the annual and monthly cost of maintaining the department.

City Engineer's Department—One city engineer, \$3000 per year; one assistant, \$1500 per year; one chief draughtsman, \$1500 per year; three assistant draughtsmen, \$3600 per year; one clerk, \$1200, two rodmen, \$1800 per year; one man and team, \$1248 per year; one janitor, \$144 per year; one inspector of plumbing and sewer, \$1680 per year; total, twelve employees, \$15,672 per year, or \$1306 per month.

Engineer of Sewer Construction J. Fewson Smith, Jr., at 5 per day, and a rodman at \$2.50 per day, are employed as their services are required from day to day, which makes the above figures an under estimate, though they cannot be called permanent employees.

Street Department—One supervisor, \$2000 per year; one superintendent poll tax, \$1002 per year, \$3.50 per day; one office boy, \$260 per year, \$5 per week; one stableman, \$750 per year, or \$2 per day; one carpenter and flume man, \$780 per year, or \$2.50 per day; one driver of city cart, \$624 per year, or \$2 per day; two drivers of city teams, \$1248 per year, or \$2 per day each; total, eight men, \$7134 per year, or \$594.55 per month.

The superintendent of poll tax also acts as clerk to the supervisor. A collector of poll tax is employed in season at \$2.50 per day, and this system collected the poll tax in 1891 at a cost of 15 1/2 per cent. There are three foremen employed in this department as they are needed, at a salary of \$3.50, \$3 and \$2.50 per day respectively; laborers receive \$2 per day, and teams with drivers only \$3.50 per day.

City Cemetery—One sexton, \$1200 per year.

City Water-tax Collector—One assessor and collector, \$1500 per year; one clerk, \$900 per year; total, two men, \$2400 per year, or \$200 per month.

Police Department—One marshal and chief of police, \$2400 per year; one captain, \$1440 per year, or \$120 per month; two sergeants, \$2640 per year, or \$110 per month each; one acting sergeant, \$1320 per year, or \$110 per month; seventeen patrolmen, \$1700 per year, or \$100 per month each; eight patrolmen, \$720 per year, or \$60 per month each; one special, \$1200 per year, two specials, \$2160 per year, or \$90 per month each; one desk sergeant, \$1200 per year; two mounted police, \$2640 per year, or \$110 per month each; two patrol drivers, \$2160 per year, or \$90 per month each; one park police, \$1080 per year, or \$90 per month; one guard at jail, \$1080 per year; one jailor, \$900 per year, or \$75 per month; one electrician, \$180 per year, or \$15 per month; total, 44 men, \$25,220 per year, or \$2101.66 2/3 per month.

Waterworks Department—One superintendent, \$2000 per year; three men City creek, \$2275 per year, or \$43.75 per week, seven nights and days; one man Emigration pump, \$910 per year, or \$17.50 per week, seven days; three nightwatchmen, \$2366 per year, or \$45.50 per week, four men and teams, \$3510 per year, or \$67.50 per week, six days; two men and
