this island is a good country for "fefee," or devil fish. It is very difficult for me to describe this fish, but it is something after the snake species, with at least seven or eight legs. This the natives devour raw, and with a re-lish, just as we would a fat chicken. I have eaten much of it when cooked, but cannot say that I fully enjoy it.

The food is prepared and ready for eating about 11 a m. The people then take down the table, plates, knives and forks, which consist of a plated cocoalorks, which consist of a plated cocoanut leaf, about three feet long by one wide. When the meal is over the dishes are put in order in a few seconds, and generally all the diners indulge in a siesta. After this they have a long smoke and then converse for an hour or more; then eat again, after-wards do a little work in the vao(bush) or go to the centre of the village where most of the time they are playing a native game.

The women help in nearly all kinds of work. When the tide is out they all turn out and go inside the reef, searching under rocks for fish and sea worms

of various kinds.

A kind of sickness prevails here which is not found in many other parts of the world. This is the "Feefee" or big leg, which some say is caused by lying continually on the damp ground; others attribute it to the climate.

In concluding my letter, I trust you are all well and enjoying the spirit of your calling, as the missionaries are in Samoa and other parts. I can bear testimony that a mission is the bestschool a young man can have in this world, and it would be the salvation of many of our young men at home if they could spend a few years in the work of God in the outside world. True, a person may gain experience at home in the work, if zealous and full of the Spirit, but they will not obtain the experience that they would were they in the world; for here we have to rely more fully upon our heavenly Father. I can now see where I squandered my golden moments while at home. I golden moments while at home. I might have improved myself better for the ministry, and I look back upon those moments with regret. I would say to my young brethren, "Take hold of the precious moments and let them not pass by unheeded or without your learning things that will be to your advantage hereafter in the King-dom of God. There are great responsibilities resting upon us as servants of God in this dispensation in searching out Israel and warning the people of their sins and the wrath of God upon the wicked. Prepare yourselves while at home, and do not wait for Improvement until you get out in the Grasp every opportunity that affords

We are all here at headquarters awaiting our mail and four missionaries from Zion. We are all enjoying good health and spirits.

THE PEACOCK LIQUOR LICENSE AGAIN.

The same committee submitted a report in regard to the petition of A. J. Peacock for a renewal of his liquor license. The committee on license reported that the petitioner had been doing business at his present place since March, 1890. He had tendered since March, 1890. He had tendered the amount of the license to the treasurer and had filed his bond. committee was of the opinion that the Council had no authority to discriminate arbitrarily as between individuals applying for license, there being no ordinance to justify such action. The proper course of procedure would be to enact an ordinance providing that after a certain time licenses would no longer be granted to carry on this business in certain localities. The committee recommended that the Council reconsider its action and grant the petition.

Mayor Scott-I understand the petitioner is now dead. Is that so?

Councilman Cohn-Yes, he is dead, very dead; but his heirs are living and they wish to conduct the business. I move that the license be granted. As a member of the license committee I think that a wrong has been committed in denying the prayer of the petitioner, that wrong should be righted, and immediately.

Councilman Hall-I am of the same opinion; I think it only right and pro-

per to grant the license.

The motion to reconsider was carried.

Councilman Hall then moved that action on the petition be held over for one week.

Councilman Pembroke -- I cannot see any reason for this. I believe that the city had no authority to refuse licenses unless there was some reason, and am of the opinion that the Supreme Court would so hold. The motion to defer was lost and the report was adopted.
