MESSAGE AND ORDER BY THE PRESIDENT.

Washington, 11.
The President sent a message to the Senate to-day as follows:—In compliance with the Senate resolution respecting points of commencement of the Pacific railroad on the hundredth degree of west longitude, and of the branch road from the western boundary of Iowa to said hundredth degree of longitude, I transmit the accompanying report of the Secretary of the interior, conveying the information called for. I deem it proper to add that on the 17th of Nov. an executive order was made on this subject, and delivered to the President of the Union Pacific railroad, which fixed the point on the western boundary of the State of Iowa from which the company should construct their branch road to the hundredth degree of longitude, and declared it to be within the limits of the townships of Iowa opposite Omaha. Since then the company has represented to me that, upon actual surveys made, it has determined upon the precise point of departure of its said branch road from the Missouri river, and located the same as described in the accompanying report of the Secretary of the interior, which point is within the limits designated in the order of Nov. Inasmuch as that order is not on record in any of the departments, and company desiring a more definite one, I have made an order, of which a copy is herewith transmitted, to caused the same to be filed in the department of the interior.

The order referred to is as follows:—In pursuance of the provisions of section 19 of an act of Congress, entitled an act to aid in the construction of a railroad and telegraph from the Missouri river to the Pacific, etc., authorizing the President to fix the point on the western boundary of the State of Iowa from which the Pacific railroad Co. is authorized to construct upon the most direct practicable route, subject to the approval of the President of the United States, so as to form a connection with the line of said Co. at some point within the hundredth meridian of longitude, I, Abraham Lincoln, President of the United States, upon application of said Co., designate and establish such first above named point on the western boundary of Iowa east of and opposite Omaha, done at the city of Washington, this 7th day of March, 1864.

AN ACT

In relation to Territorial, County, City and School Taxes.

Sec. 1. Be it enacted by the Governor and Legislative Assembly of the Territory of Utah: That the Territorial Tax shall hereafter be one-half of one per cent. per annum; to be paid in money or Auditor's Warrants. And that each county and incorporate city is hereby respectively authorized to assess and collect a tax not to exceed one-fourth of one per cent: Provided that the Assessor of the Territorial and county taxes, also be the assessor of such city taxes as are herein authorized within his county. And each county school district may by a two-thirds vote of the tax payers of the district assess and collect a tax not to exceed one-fourth of one per cent for the purpose of assisting to pay qualified school teachers and to provide suitable books.

Sec. 2. That the time required for completing the assessment of property for Territorial and County taxes shall be the first Monday of June in each year, as formerly provided in section one of, "An act amending an act prescribing the manner of assessing and collecting Territorial and County taxes, approved January 21, 1859," and that "An act in relation to the manner of assessing and collecting Territorial taxes, approved January 17, 1862" is hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. That the word "September" in section 2, page 22, of the compilation act approved January 16, 1862, relating to the five per cent. on the amount of tax due, be so amended as to read "December."

Sec. 4. That all laws and parts of laws which were repealed in any charter in this Territory by the passage of "an act entitled an act in relation to Territorial County and City taxes approved January 17, 1862," are hereby renewed and made of full force; and all laws and parts of laws conflicting with this act are hereby repealed.

AN ACT.

To incorporate the Seventies' Library and Reading Room Association.

Sec. 1. Be it enacted by the Governor and Legislative Assembly of the Territory of Utah. That Joseph Young, Senr., Albert P. Rockwood, Horace S. Eldredge, John Van Cot, John V. Long, James W. Cummings, Robert L. Campbell, Thos. Bullock, Wm. S. Godbe, Robert Campbell, Elias L. T. Harrison and James McKnight, of Great Salt Lake City, and their successors in office are hereby constituted a body corporate with perpetual succession, to be known and styled the Seventies' Library and Reading Room Association, and shall have power to purchase, receive and hold property; to sue and be sued; to plead and be impleaded, defend and be defended in all courts of law and equity and in all actions whatsoever, and to do and perform all things that may of right pertain to their duties in the regulation, control and suitably providing for the interests and carrying into effect the objects of this organization; and the above named persons are hereby appointed a Board of Directors of said Association until an election shall take place.

Sec. 2. That a Board of Directors shall be elected by the members of said Association on the fourth Monday in January 1865, and thereafter annually. The Directors shall have power to appoint a Secretary, Treasurer and Librarian and such other officers as may be deemed necessary, also to fill any vacancy that may occur in the board; and at the close of their term of office shall present to the Association a report of the number of books, papers and other publications on hand, the amount of monies received and disbursed during the year, the number of books donated and by whom; also the amount incurred for services of Librarian and other incidental expenditures. A majority of the Directors shall constitute a Quorum to do business; and for the proper management of the Library and Reading Room, they shall have power to frame bye-laws, which, upon receiving the sanction of two-thirds of the members present at any stated meeting shall be in full force.

Sec. 3. That the Library and Reading room shall be for the use and benefit of the public, subject to such regulations as may in the bye-laws be prescribed.

Sec. 4. Conditions of membership shall be as made and provided by the Directors.
