

# PEACE HOVERS OVER ZION CITY.

Warring Factions Nearer Amicable Solution of Troubles Than at Any Time.

## DOWIE WANTS A VINDICATION.

Desires Reinstatement With Full Power and Then He Will Issue An Edict.

Chicago, April 13.—Peace hovers over the warring factions that are endeavoring to secure control of Zion City. This statement was authorized tonight by the legal advisers of both Dowie and General Overseer Voliva. After an all-day conference, Atty. Emil C. Watten, representing Dowie, said: "We are nearer a peaceful solution of the question tonight than we have been at any stage of the proceedings. We have changed our minds relative to the filing of a bill in equity declaring the transferring of the ownership of the property of Zion City by Voliva to Deacon Alexander Granger to be void, and will await further developments. "Today, as a matter of fact, we filed a paper in the circuit court of Lake county of this state, declaring that the power of attorney granted to General Overseer Voliva by John Alexander Dowie was absolutely void, inasmuch as Voliva had not acted in accordance with the instructions given him in reference to the execution of the power delegated to him by Dowie, and had designed to transcend his authority and misappropriate the property of Dowie, and that thereupon Dowie forwarded a telegram revoking the power of attorney."

According to the contestants, the decision of the court upon the validity of the telegraphic revocation of the power of attorney will decide the question as to in whom rests the control of Zion City. "On this question Atty. Watten said: "The telegraphic power of attorney designed to Voliva by Dowie is absolutely legal and will stand in any court of law."

At the termination of today's conference, which was participated in by Judge V. V. Barnes, legal adviser of Zion City; Jacob Newman, counsel for Voliva and his forces; and Atty. Watten, representing Dowie, Mr. Newman said:

"Dowie and his advisers admitted today that we have in our possession documentary evidence to the effect that Dowie and his advisers admit that 95 per cent of the property belongs to the Christian Catholic church, and he has furthermore acquiesced in the proposition that he be given 5 per cent of the property, when he has been installed in temporary control, both ecclesiastical and financial, he will resign. In other words, he desires to be vindicated, related with the full powers attending the first apostleship of the Christian Catholic church, whereupon he will issue an edict declaring that 95 per cent of the property of Zion City belongs to the church and that 5 per cent belongs to him (Dowie). According to the conservative estimates given out by the two factions, that would give to Dowie \$1,000,000 and to the church \$19,000,000."

## MAJ. EDWARDS MAY BRING SUIT FOR CRIMINAL LIBEL.

Pendleton, Ore. April 13.—Major O. C. Edwards superintendent of the Umatilla Indian reservation, threatens, as a result of the recent publication of a petition to the bureau of Indian affairs, signed by 125 Indians and charging him (Edwards) with various offenses, to bring what may be a most widely distributed suit for criminal libel. Today Maj. Edwards said: "Dist. Atty. Phelps and stated his desire to prosecute all newspapers responsible for the publication for criminal libel. He holds the allegations in the petition to be false, that publication has injured his official character and his private honor. He also holds that inasmuch as the petition was filed with the interior department it was not a public record."

At the last session of the Murray city council, the following business came up for consideration:

The attorney reported on the rejected bill for register fees which the county refuses to pay. He also gives his opinion as to the legality and propriety of the city officials performing work for the city outside of their official capacity. He cited sections 22 and 23 of the Revised Statutes of Utah which bear out his conclusion in holding that it is illegal for any officer of the city to work for or be connected with any contracts which draw from the city's funds other than the discharge of his office duties. The building inspector requested that proper blanks be furnished for his use. The attorney was instructed to prepare the same.

The recorder's quarterly report was read and accepted.

The committee on streets recommended that the Bell Telephone company be ordered to remove its poles to the curb north on Seventeenth South on State street. After the report had been accepted the attorney referred the council to the franchise of the city.

The committee also recommended that the company cannot be forced to remove their poles under present conditions. The committee also recommended that the city purchase the franchise from Little Cottonwood to Seventeenth South, 18 feet; on Vine and Seventeenth South, eight feet; and on Poplar street, six feet and on the corner of the intersection of the city and the railroad, which was obstructing the progress of laying the water pipes.

Instructions were given Road Supervisor Wood to raise the grade stone on the corner of Seventeenth South.

New York, April 13.—Louis Cure, the Parisian billiardist, played his third game for the world's championship 182 tonight and defeated George Sutton by a score of 500 to 475. This was the Frenchman's first victory here, as he had been beaten earlier in the week by Morningstar and Sisson.

Cure played a very steady game, and at the end of the tenth inning was 240 points ahead of Sutton. The latter is noted for his nerve-plays, and he gave a fine exhibition of nerve and skill when he made the high run of the week's play in his sixteenth inning, scoring 13 points. It was a hard fought game, and Cure's score was a hard one to make.

Willie Hoppe, the young American champion who holds the world's championship by a score of 181, defeated Ora Morningstar in the afternoon game by a score of 500 to 257, and the game was finished in the twenty-sixth inning.

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## OVER A HUNDRED.

Hoppe played in masterly fashion all the way through, clearly demonstrating his thorough knowledge of the game. His best run was 145 in the twelfth inning, during which he scored 100 points. He is known in billiard circles as "The King of the Billiard Table."

Morningstar did not play as well as in his previous games this week. His best effort resulted in a run of 37 in the ninth inning. Hoppe's average was 9.5 in 20 high runs. Morningstar's average was 7.25 in 20 high runs.
