THE MONEY CRISIS IN EUROPE.

The disappearance of coin from France, and consequent depreciation of paper, is one of the necessary results of a disastrous war and purchased peace, and may cause more suffering than did the bloody campaign of last summer. That cunning old spider, Bismarck, in the center of his web at Berlin, holds under his control the golden threads which have already hopelessly entangled France, are gathering about England, and are likely to involve other powers. If France encounters such financial distress in paying the second milliard, what must be her condition before the whole debt is discharged; and if England is already drawn in to such an extent as to raise the money rate in the Bank of England from two to five per cent. in a week, how long, if this continues, before the crash comes? England is certainly not prepared in her already disturbed condition to stand such a storm long, as it will still further unsettle the already unsatisfactory relations of labor to capital in that country—a necessary consequence of a general change in prices. More than half of the people of England to-day are able merely to live from hand to mouth. A little less of wages or a little more to pay for necessities, and starvation stares the workmen in the face.

While France is suffering from scarcity of coin, Germany is plethoric from the abundance of it. If Bismarck is merely keeping the immense quantity of the precious metals which are in his possession for the purpose of recoinage them according to a new German standard, he would do well to spend as short time in the process as he possibly can, otherwise there is no telling to what extent the monetary system of the world will be disarranged, and Germany will be made to suffer too in the end. The London *Economist* is already holding out the threat that the Bank of England will raise its rate of discount to a high figure, and so embarrass monetary transactions with Germany that the latter will be glad to act in a more liberal manner towards France. The future operations of the agencies now at work will be watched with interest from this side of the Atlantic, for any great disturbance of values will have its effect in this country.—*Washington Star*.

THE BAPTISTS ON THE BLAST.

The Baptists, we perceive, have lately taken the field against tobacco, and issued a counterblast furious as that of King James himself. The brethren are invited to consider whether total abstinence from the noxious weed might not be conducive to piety; but the effort will probably be as unsuccessful as that of their royal predecessor, as it is found that many of themselves are devoutly attached to its use. They do not, to be sure, indulge to such an inordinate extent as our worthy President, who is said to possess the faculty of "fuddling" himself as completely on tobacco as on whisky, though we are inclined to believe that he prefers a mixture of both; but one of them contended for its harmlessness on the ground that he had used it since a boy of tea, another alleged that it inspired him with ghostly thoughts, and a third, who admitted that smoking might be sinful, finally got rid of it by proposing to include tea and coffee in the motion, if the all-pervading herb was condemned. This ingenious sidewind baffled the proposition that "the use of tobacco is an expensive indulgence, involving a large outlay of the Lord's money that might be advantageously used for the Kingdom of Heaven."—*New York Star*.

STANTON ON GRANT.—Mr. Sumner, in consequence of the unworthy treatment which he received by the President, has apparently been provoked into disclosing some very unexpected intelligence which he received from the late Edwin M. Stanton, concerning Grant, shortly before his demise. Inviting the Massachusetts Senator to his presence he said:

"I am going over the river, but there is one thing I wish to say before I die—Grant cannot administer this Government, he is unequal to the duties."

On Mr. Sumner expressing his surprise, and asking why Stanton, with these sentiments, had supported Grant, the dying statesman emphatically replied:

"You are mistaken; I supported the Republican Party, I did not support the man."—*N. Y. Star*.
