This morning a terrible accident occurred at the north end of the C. P. yard, in this city, by which a assenger on the emigrant train sustained such injuries as will probably result in his death. As it is well known, when the C. P. emigrant train arrives each morning at the switch near the depot, the caboose is disconnected to the caboose be held in the Council House, which goes on, leaving the caboose Friday) evening, at half for a time, until the engine, after side-tracking the other cars, returns and draws the caboose into the depot. This morning a man named Reuben Doyle, of probably sixty-two years, a farmer of good circumstances, and a resident of Seattle. Washington Territory, was standing upon the platform of the caboose when the train was uncoupled from it. Fearing that the train had become thus uncoupled accidentally, and that he and the other emigrants were go-ing to be left behind, he made a jump from his position, to catch the hind ear of the moving train, which by this time was about eight feet dis-tant from the caboose. This latter was also on the move, a brakesman

being engaged in setting the brake to bring it to a stop. As the old man jumped, the brakesman and a peanut boy, knowing very well that he would fall, and be run over by the caboose, grasped at, and caught him, as his feet left the platform. The brakesman held to him as long from his perilous position as to cause he brakeman's grasp to relax, and he unfortunate man fell to the ground, his right leg across the track.
