

## MUST HAVE BEEN A REMARKABLE MAN

Henry Gets Juror Removed "As Unfit and Immoral Person, Opposed to Law."

### FORD'S LAWYERS WANTED HIM

Made Hard and Bitter Fight—Probationary Panel is Now Complete.

Sad Friction, Oct. 18.—Inside information of open game, "black-jack," "chicken-in-the-kid" and bridge whilst, complicated with charges of immorality and perjury hung into the teeth of a qualified juror by prosecuting Francis J. Henry, indicated the closing hours of to-day's session of the Ford bribery trial and incidentally provoked from Atty A. A. Moore of the defense a speech remarkable for its offhand bluntness and scathing force.

Without exercising one of his five peremptory challenges or Harry H. Berg the first of the 12 jurors accepted subject to arbitrary dismissal, and, with this object in view, renewed his examination. He is a Filmore street cigar dealer, and yesterday he testified that gambling was not carried on in a room in the rear of his shop.

This statement did not tally with what Detective William J. Burns knew of the place, and this afternoon Henry forced from Berg admissions that until a short time before the recent appointment of Chief of Police Blackman, gambling games were regularly carried on there also that he himself had gambled at bridge while in the rear room no longer ago than last night.

After a long and bitter fight ended by Ford's lawyer, Henry succeeded in having Berg removed from the panel. As an unfit and immoral person, a cynical and unscrupulous opponent to the "whited sepulcher."

The first hour of this morning's session of Judge Lawler's court added three probatorial jurors to the six who yesterday passed the qualification tests in the selection of a panel to try They L. Ford for the bribe of Superintendent J. Phillips.

From the Government underlined: William J. Conrad, a retired dealer in paints and oils, and Russell H. Johnson, in the furniture business, answered to the satisfaction of the law if not, to count, the multitude of queries put to them, and were passed on to the box, subject to peremptory challenges.

Edward T. Morton, formerly a hotel proprietor, now an employee of Weller, Farno & Co., and Leon A. Lazarus, a jeweler, were accepted as the tenth and eleventh tentative jurors, before the final recess was taken.

Twenty-two veniremen were examined today. Eighteen had the qualification tests and completed the probationary panel. Adjournment was taken until Monday morning when peremptory challenges will be exercised.

### PHILADELPHIA CHINAMEN HAVE FREE FOR ALL FIGHT

Philadelphia, Oct. 18.—A fight between two Chinese in Chinatown this afternoon developed into a riot the rival gang leaders taking sides. Pistols and knives were drawn in the crowded quarters.

The police received frantic appeals. Districts were hastily summoned and had great difficulty in quelling the disturbance. Arrests were made. One Chinaman was killed.

There had been considerable trouble among the Chinese in their race street vicinity. Before policemen on duty there had been a fight between the two men who were fighting in the street. Both appeared from all the houses and a free fight ensued. Pistols were fired from houses and the police were powerless to stop the melee and when the reserves arrived it was a race with clubs and soon the policeman was killed and the other man wounded, two had been injured severely enough to be sent to a hospital. Worldwide arrests of Chinese are being made.

train at Stetson, nine miles south of Arden, by three desperate young characters who have as yet not been captured. The dead man is Charles Fink, aged 20, whose father and mother are believed to live in Denver, Colo. The injured men, his companions in travel, are William Hendick, hit in the leg, near the knee, and Fred Mason shot through the calf of the leg. All are laboring men recently employed on farms in Dakota, and were enroute to Bedford, Colo., to work.

The three men went in a box car loaded with lumber, as the train was pulling out of Stetson. These desperadoes looking young fellows climbed into the car, lighted a candle and ordered the occupants to throw up their hands, one of them holding a revolver to the head of Hendick. Fink, who was behind Hendick, reached for the high-wayman's gun and the fight began. The man with the gun called to an passenger to stop. A fusilade of shots followed and Fink fell with a bullet in his breast and the other shot the wounds stated. The murderous gang then jumped from the moving train and made their escape.

Fink lived for a few hours, dying as he was being brought into the yards at Arden.

None of the three men shot had arms.

## FARMER CONGRESS FORMALLY OPENED

Thousand Delegates and Visitors Assemble in Oklahoma City To Discuss Matters.

**PRODUCTS BRING HIGH PRICES**

Training in Farmer's Home Produces Highest Type of Manhood And Womanhood.

Oklahoma City, Okla., Oct. 18.—About 1,000 delegates and visitors to the Farmers' National congress were present when the congress was called to order at 9:30 a.m. in convention hall.

In completing the program which was initiated yesterday, H. D. Watson of Kearny, N.J., delivered an address on "Dry Farming," showing how the principle developed could be used to advantage even in regions where rainfall is abundant. His experiments in the new state showed great difference in yields in fields side by side.

Mr. Watson was followed by President John M. Stark, who delivered his annual address. He said in part: "The year drawing to a close has been one of unusual sectional victories. The farmers of higher prices, the farmers of the Eastern United States will receive almost or quite \$1,000,000,000 more for their crop than they did last year.

"Unlike that of the captains of high finance, stock manipulators, buyers of governing officials, our wealth is clean. Every farmer makes his own living, and it's hard to find a crooked markman, that much more for comfort and happiness.

"But we are not to be congratulated alone on our wealth; no other class is so thoroughly and widely educated in the broadest sense of the word; no other class has such provision for education as the farmers. The farmer in the farm's home is yet found that training that produces the highest type of manhood and womanhood and upon which the country must rely."

The report was debated with animation and Mr. Fairbanks' name was eliminated, however, instead of being made to a "high official in the councils of church and nation."

### GOV. HUGHES DOES NOT SEEK ANY PUBLIC OFFICE

Missouri Presbyterian Command Methods for Sitting on Fairbanks.

New York, Oct. 18.—Gov. Hughes tonight made a declaration of his attitude toward the members of an address to the Synod of New Jersey, given him by his honor by the Republican Club.

"I do not seek any public office. I have no ambition to seek any office, either directly, to influence the selection or the vote of any delegate to any convention, and with reference to the selection of any delegate to any convention that of influence, protest or reprisal."

It was at this same club that Mr. Hughes announced his acceptance of the gubernatorial nomination of the Democratic party, with a review of his administration, particularly with reference to the legislation which had been accomplished for the state, and with a proposal to prohibit prostitution and other important measures with whose creation and support he has been identified.

Additional significance was given his speech by the reason of his fact that he took occasion to refer to his position in regard to the fusion of the Republicans and the independence leaguers on the New York platform.

Talking in this personal vein, I may say that I have steadfastly refrained from becoming associated in any manner with the fusionists, and have never had any connection with or interest in the ambitious or efforts of rivals for political preferment or political leadership in any locality.

I have seen party activities conducted honorably, the free expression of popular choice and to have the party organization represent the views and interests of the members of the party without any interference on the part of the executive. To this end I have favored the adoption of plan or direct nomination, which have been adopted in many states, that the plan could have a fair trial in the communities where it has the support of public sentiment. It is of great importance that the duration of the governorship should not be embarrassed by attempts at political management.
