REPUBLICAN NOMINEES.

Ticket Completed at Last Night's Primaries When Councilmen Were Named.

Probate and Other Court Business—
Weber County Affairs Transacted by Commissioners.

Last evening Republican primaries were held in the various wards for the selection of their nominees for the council. The meetings in the various wards were well attended, and enthusiasm prevailed.

In the first ward Thomas H. Carr, a present member of the council, and Robert B. Plaine, a check clerk on the Southern Pacific, were chosen as the councilman candidates.

In the second ward Dr. H. J. Powers, a present incumbent, was chosen, with J. E. Williams.

The third ward elected as their representatives William G. Cross, a present incumbent of the council, and Harvey P. Randall.

The fourth ward delegates chose Fred W. Chambers and F. J. Henderson, and in the fifth ward William Driver and Fred J. Nye were selected as their candidates.

IN THE DISTRICT COURT.
In the matter of the estate of Lare H. Nelson, deceased, Judge Rolan rendered his decision granting the petition of the widow, Ellen Nelson, for issuance of letters of administration to herself.

This is the estate in which a special administrator was appointed and later three special administrators and appraisers. The widow filed a petition praying that she be appointed administrator, the children of the deceased, by his first wife, and heirs to the estate, filed a cross-petition setting that the widow, the second wife of the deceased, was incompetent on the grounds that she could not speak the English language, and was influenced by a certain Christian Science official. The court held that the widow was competent and ordered that she be appointed administratrix.

In the case of Annie E. Gorrine vs. W. S. Reed, the court ordered that the defendant have to pay and include Nov. 1, 1901, to prepare, serve and file bill of exceptions.

A. S. Condon vs. August Nichols and Louis Christensen, trial as to the defendant Christensen came on for hearing. The defendant failed to put in an appearance and judgment was entered in favor of plaintiff against Christensen.

In the case of Williams vs. Ogden City, the plaintiff's motion for a new trial was denied.

Emily C. Stanley vs. C. E. Oulter; appeal from the justice of the peace court was denied upon the ground that the appeal was not filed during the time fixed by statute.

In the matter of the estate of John Farrell, deceased, a petition was filed by Janet Farnell, praying that she be appointed administratrix of the estate. The estate is valued at \$4,400, consisting of real estate situated in Eden, Weber County, and personal property. Hearing on petition was set for Friday, October 25, 1901.

In the matter of the estate and guardianship of Newton I. Silverstein, a petition was filed praying for the appointment of Taylor T. Trostaki as guardian. Hearing on petition was set for October 25, 1901, at 10 a. m.

WEBER COUNTY AFFAIRS.
At the meeting of the board of county commissioners a communication was received from R. M. Blodgett with reference to the bridge contract, requesting that the board should proceed to make the excavations necessary for the piers of the bridge so that the work of construction may be proceeded with. The communication was ordered filed.

Sheriff Layton has been making one to the board asking for the appointment of K. L. Heninger as deputy sheriff be revoked on the grounds that he is guilty of grossly immoral conduct while in office. The appointment was revoked.

The county attorney recommended that the claims of Samuel Dixon for \$26.10, the Ogden Fire department No. 3 for \$25.00, the claims of W. H. Rich for \$25.00 in Weber county. The claims were disallowed.

Sanitary Inspector J. H. Watkins notified the board of an ordinance providing for the cleaning and inspection of all ice ponds in Weber county. The communication was filed and the clerk instructed to notify all health officers in the county of the same. Board adjourned for one week.

Deep Mourning Over Announcement of President Snow's Death.

The beet crop is looking fine and a great deal of fruit has been taken up this season, but not so many tomatoes. The season has not been so good for tomatoes, but the beet crop is very good.

The telephone company is putting up a line from the Hooper section to Hooper, and from there to Syracuse, so that we will be connected with Ogden and other cities and towns, and we are in hopes to have a spur run from the sugar factory to Hooper next year and by so doing will increase our acreage of beets.

Daniel Farnham, our enterprising merchant, has erected a very fine store and dance hall of brick, and will soon have it finished.
