Eager, Apache Co., Ariz., Feb.9 .- This ward is in Round Valley, and is two and half miles from Springerville, but in the same valley, the latter being down in the center of the valley and this place is on the rising ground to the south. The people are at work on this large one now, and it i estimated that it will take ten thousand dollars to complete it. The water is brought into the valley through three canals. These ditches are not the kind that are easily made with plow and but are steep side hill ditches scraper, made with pick and shovel or blasted out of the hard material. The highest of these, which winds around the mountain sides, over cliffs and precipitous ground, is eleven miles long, another about seven, and the other five and a half miles long. These canals and res ervoirs have been constructed by the people under trying conditons of pov-erty and privation; the people would would work until their supplies were gone and then go off and earn fresh supplies and return to work again. Yet under all these discouraging conditons, the people have persevered and if they have not been blessed with great wealth they have been filled with faith, and their faith is shown in the work they have accomplished in wresting this land from the desert. Some of the people here have acquired herds of stock, others flocks of sheep, and these are prosper-But the drouth that has visited ing. the country has made it hard on the agriculturist. But the heavy snow of the 5th has tended to lift the gloom as it promises to fill the reservoirs with water. The financial conditions have

not been encouraging, but the outlook is now more promising. OLD TIMERS STILL IN THE VAN.

Among the old timers who once lived Salt Lake and who now reside here, is Lorenzo Brown, whose home used to be in the Seventh ward, at the corner of Sixth South and East Temple streets. Samuel H. Marble is also here. He was of the Pioneers of Utah, arriving in Salt Lake valley July 24, 1847. Mr. Mar. ble ran a ferry on Green river on the old emigrant road in 1849 and '50, and moved from Salt Lake to Manti in 1851, and later on to Richfield, which place he was obliged to abandon on account of Indian troubles. He has been on the frontier ever since, and though aged and worn with frontier labors, narrates with great clearness his early experi-ences. S. W. Wiltbeck is another veteran who came to Utah in an early day; he was one of the Fort Supply mission. aries, and was called to Dixle in 1861, and lived in St. George until called Arizona. Father Wiltbeck is full of life and story and joke. These men, young in mind, but wise in years, be-long to the sturdy class of men who made civilization possible in " these mountain wilds, and whose labors have made the desert a fruitful field.
