## PUTS A STOP TO ROUGH RIDING

Judge Blum of Ogden races puts a stop to foul work and suspends Jockey Shriner.

Judge Blum of the Ogden race meeting will not tolerate foul tactics on the part of jockeys was evidenced yesterday afternoon when he issued an order suspending Jockey Henry Shriner for a cowardly act in the fourth race. Shriner had the mount on Jolter, the winner in the fourth race, and Jockey A. Thomas was on Buckthorne. Coming into the stretch Shriner saw that his mount was destined to be beaten and so deliberately leaned over and struck little Thomas with his whip several times over the head. The little fellow was game, however, and beat the favorite by 12½ parts. Judge Blum took immediate action and suspended Shriner.

The track was heavy yesterday owing to rains and it was a day for the jockeys. The attendance was much lighter because of the disagreeable condition of the weather.

It was a bold day for the favorites, as some of them won. One second, two wins and a couple of long shots added the purses. Lord Nelson was a strong favorite in the second race, yet the talent got a severe jolt when Jessie Jessel made a runaway match and won easily.

MAY ARRANGE FOR BASEBALL SERIES.


For a mile with a standing start, Hobart, in a Bens (German) model, made of 100 horse-power, will be the first official record for such an auto in American automobile racing annals.

#### FIGHT CONTINUES FOR GOLF CHAMPIONSHIP.

Wheaton, Ill., Sept. 7.—Two easterners and 14 players from the western clubs remain to fight for the national amateur golf championship, as the result of today's match play in the national tournament.

The easterners are the seasoned old campaigners, Walter J. Davis of Garden City, who displayed a remarkable record of Evanson after a sensational match which went to holes and Thomas M. Sherman of Utica, N. Y., who put A. W. Thillinghurst of Philadelphia out of the running in 1 up in 12 holes.

The westerners include Charles Evans, Jr., H. Chandler Egan, D. K. Sawyer, Mason Phelps and Warren K. Wood and Paul and Robert Hunter.

Paul Hunter, Jr., yesterday equalled the course record of 21, made by the Englishman, Norman E. Hunter, when the team of English amateurs toured the United States in 1903, will meet "Ned" Sawyer tomorrow. Chandler Egan will contest with Warren K. Wood, while Evans will play against A. Stillwell.

Sherman, if successful tomorrow, may have to meet Chandler. Egan was in poor playing form, the form that won the national championship for him twice, twice to K. Wood.

The struggle for the honor of low score in the qualifying rounds resulted in a triple tie between T. M. Sherman of Utica, son of the vice president; Charles Evans, Jr., of Elmwood, western champion; and Bob Gardner of Hindmarsh, the Yale pole vaulter. Later in the week the three will settle it off and decide the possession of the gold medal that goes with the honor.

These three men made the 36 holes in 151 each.

Chandler Egan, former national champion, came within one stroke of making it a quadruple tie, his round being 15, a total of 152 for the two days' play.

Pulling for the first round match play resulted in disaster, especially to the western contingent. But the east suffered also. Fred Harrenhoff and W. J. Travis were brought together and T. M. Sherman was paired with A. W. Thillinghurst.

The western contingent, Chandler Egan, D. K. Sawyer, Warren K. Wood, Albert Smith and Charles Evans were the first half of the drawings, and the second round at stated time tomorrow will see the defeat of some of these. Sherman is also in the first half.

It was nearly 3 o'clock when the first pair drove off.
