Then he proceeded to unravel his latest scheme. It is to have this legislature appropriate \$5,000 to be spent in making a show at the next Irrigation congress. This is to be held in California, and California, says Mr. Kiesel, thinks that horticultural inter-ests in that state so far surpass all other western states, that the rest of the country hardly deserve mention in the field.

"I'd just like to go down and, show those fellows," said Mr. Kiesel with that convincing air which usually brings the money. "I'd just like to see Utah go down there next fall and beat California out of her boots, just as we beat Idaho. They won't be expecting us. We can spring the greatest surprise of the year on them, and the state ought to put up the money, instead of certain people by contribution, because every citizen ought to be in on the movement, and help out. It was mighty hard to go around soliciting funds for the Boise exhibit. A state appropria-tion ought to be made, and then we ought to get to work right away pre-paring to make the hardest fight that is in us to win first honors in the cele-brated horticultural state to the west-ward." ward.

The appropriation being urged by Mr. Kiesel is in line with a recommendation made by Gov. Cutler in his message, fa-voring a horticultural exhibit at the next irrigation congress.

The rule pro-vides that any student who does not pass in two-thirds of his subjects will be dropped from the course for the remainder of the year, and may not re-enter until the following year. The measure is designed to do away with re-enter until the following year.
