Is it then to be inferred that, in accepting the title, I fall into the error imputed to the prince who returning from exile, declared null and void all that had been done in his absence? Far from me be such a wild mistake. Not only do I recognize the governments which have preceded me, but I inherit in some manner all that they have accomplished of good and evil; for governments which succeed one to another, are notwithstanding different origin, liable for their predecessors; but the more completely I accept all that fifty years history has transmitted to us, with the full authority, the less is it permitted me to pass in silence over the glorious reign of the house of my family, and the regular though ephemeral title of his son, whom the two Chambers proclaimed in the last burst of unquashed patriotism. Thus then, the title of Napoleon the third is not one of the dynastic, superannuated pretensions which seem to be an insult to good sense and to truth; it is the homage rendered to a government which was legitimate, and to which we owe the brightest pages of our modern history. My reign does not date from 1815; it dates from this very moment, when you have announced the sacrifices of the nation. Receive, then, my thanks, gentlemen of the Chamber of Deputies, for the eclat you have given to the manifestation of the national will, by rendering it more evident by your supervision, and more imposing by your declaration. I thank you, also, gentlemen of the State, for having been the first to address congratulations to me, as you were the first to give expression to the popular wish. Aid me, all of you, to sit firm in the land—upset by too many revolutions—a stable government, which shall have for its basis religion, probity and love. For the suffering classes, receive my oath that no sacrifice shall be wanting on my part to ensure the prosperity of my country; and whilst I maintain peace, I will yield in nothing which may touch the honor or the dignity of France.

Gen. Byinski the distinguished Polish general, has forwarded an address to the Emperor, saying that the Poles will range under his banner, should France renew her wars. Belgium.—The warlike preparations making by England and Prussia, taken in connection with the proclamation of the Empire in France, have caused considerable agitation at Brussels. The Turkish government is making every preparation for war, in case of an emergency. A Russia army of 30,000 men has been signally defeated by the Circassians. ALL is peace in Utah. Some paper states that Congress at their last session, appropriated 20,000 to buy Camels, to transport the mail across the continent. It is said the French are sending out a strong squadron to the Sandwich Islands. The squadron bound to Japan, is to carry 306 guns, and 3,045 men. Every object in the Moon, 100 feet high, is distinctly seen by Lord Ross' Telescope: craters of extinct volcanoes, rocks, and masses of stone; no sign of habitation like ours, no vestige of architectural remains to show the Moon is, or ever was inhabited by mortals like ourselves; no water, no sea, no river, all seems desolate. Australia is quite ahead of California in gold. Cuba is well provided against private invasion. Great Salt Lake City authorities don't understand business, for nothing and board themselves; that's the way folks go, who come here. Another paper says, Mr. Everett, Secretary of State. Great freshets in Oregon, houses carried off, much damage done. The machinery of the calorific ship Edgson works well at the docks, not ready for sailing. Opium cutting increases rapidly in N. York, 1000 lbs. retained weekly. The census of Sacramento City was 8530. Famine to a considerable extent in the mines; it was feared that hundreds would die of starvation, as the barley and acorns which they were subsisting on were nearly exhausted. It was reported that a band of Chinese on the Calaveras had killed one of their own number and eat him; they were flocking by hundreds into the city for food; whole countries almost depopulated. Among the new undertakings lately brought forward in London is one called the Vegetable Gas Light Company. Its object is to introduce the patent of an inventor who is stated to have fully succeeded in perfecting an apparatus and concocting an oil by which gas of much greater purity and brilliancy than that obtained from coal can be generated in small quantities suitable for private houses, public buildings, light-houses, steamships, &c. Its cost is represented to be relatively below that of common gas, while the trouble of its preparation is less than that required from ordinary oil lamps. Destruction of SELKIRK by a Flood.—A letter received at St. Paul's, Minnesota, announces the utter ruin of the Selkirk Settlement on the Red River of the North, by freshet. The flood began on the 2d of May and continued to the 25th. The colony, twenty-two miles in length, and from four to six miles in width, has been unminated, and crops, barns, cattle, horses, dwellings—houses—everything—the fruits of twenty-six years of industry—has been swept away, involving a loss of nearly or quite a million of dollars. This interesting, intelligent, exemplary colony was founded by Earl Selkirk, some forty years ago, and was composed chiefly of Scotch. The Earl expended large sums of money on it, and it at length became a thriving settlement.
