STOP WORK ON TUNNEL.

Harriman Depot Will Not Include Tube in Its Features.

Work on the underground tunnel under the tracks in the Harriman yards has been ordered stopped. Orders have been issued to fill as much of the hole as has been done, so \$2,500 worth of work has been de-clared useless. Just why is not given out. It is believed the tunnel was decided unnecessary by Julius Krutt-schnitt, director of maintenance, at schnitt, director of maintenance, at the time he visited this city. Rumor also has it that improvements repre-senting \$50,000 were voted unneces-sary at this time, and were ordered stopped. Other work on the depot is heing pushed ahead in good shape. Concrete foundation work will be inished in a week or 10 days, and when the ground work has been com-pleted, the steel frame work will go up rapidly. up rapidly.

Washington, D. C., April 15.-Senas-tor George Sutherland of Utah has asked the senate to withhold consid-eration of the bill he introduced some time ago at the request of the board of regents of the University of Utah, which was intended to quict in the University by legislation the title in salue lands said to be of great value in Utah. These isands are now claimed by private parties and corporations, and it is the contention of the regents of the University of Utah and others that the lands should rest in the Uni-versity by virtue of the fact that they are saline lands and that in the en-abling act all saline lands were allotted to the University of Utah.
