Saturday, Sept. 22, 1882. **A LIBERAL SOPHISM SHATTERED.** We have received a communication making inquiries in regard to the date of the passage of the first election law in this Territory. Our correspondent informs us that it is claimed by certain "Liberals" that no law was passed by the Utah Legislature on the qualifications of voters until January 21, 1880. That Judge Emerson having argued in his late decision on the suffrage, that "after the first election and until the Legislative Assembly acted, no person in the Territory had a right to vote," it follows that there were no legal voters to elect the Legislature of 1880, nor of any of the intervening dates, and therefore that body had no legal existence, and consequently there have been no valid laws passed in reference to elections, and so we have no legal voters in Utah, male or female. This, in substance, is the position taken by certain prominent "Liberals" as set forth by our correspondent. He ought to have known that they will say anything and do anything to bolster up their cause. The whole fabric of this "Liberal" sophism is built upon a foundation of falsehood. The facts are these: The Organic Act prescribed the qualifications of voters at the first election in this Territory. At that election, among other officers, members of the Legislative Assembly were elected. At the first session of that Assembly, "An Act Regulating Elections" was passed; it was approved by the Governor, January 18, 1880. The law was in accordance with the Organic Act, which provided that at all subsequent elections (after the first) "the qualifications of voters and of holding office" should be "such as shall be prescribed by the Legislative Assembly." Some changes were made in the law in 1880, but until that date the provisions of the Act of 1880 were in force. Thus the card which the "Liberals" place at the feet of their explanation, and so it would be with all their sophistry and slanderous statements. If those people would take the trouble to "know upon them" but it would be an incessant labor to attempt to refute or even notice a title of "self-abuse, falsehood and calumny." It is only when information is needed on important questions that we refer to their vagaries. Let them go on.

**NOT KEPT IN THE DARK.**  
 The Philadelphia Press, not to be out of the fashion of speaking rashly about the "Mormons," says: Mormon missionaries are not to preach polygamy, and as the mass of their converts belong to the classes who don't read there is little reason for the surprise expressed in many quarters that the Edmunds bill had no apparent effect in reducing Mormon immigration. This is intended to convey the impression that the people who join the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints abroad, and who compose the "Mormon immigration," are kept in the dark on the subject of "Mormon" plural marriage until they reach Utah. This has been frequently charged in plainer language than that used by the Press. But a great many journals offer an opposite objection. They declare that the "Mormon" immigrants, who are arriving in large numbers, come to the United States for the special purpose of breaking the laws of the land, that is, of practicing polygamy. Which is the correct position; that "Mormon" missionaries conceal "Mormon" polygamy and their converts know nothing about it, or that they seek the European continent for recruits for Mormonism? The statements are not both to be true. And yet each is insisted upon with as much vigor as the other. We will answer the question. Neither assertion is correct. "Mormon" missionaries do not generally preach on the subject of plural marriage. At the same time they do not conceal it. They are not sent abroad to promulgate the doctrine; that is not their business. It is to preach the Gospel of faith, repentance and baptism for the remission of sins, with the promise of the gift of the Holy Ghost by the laying on of hands, and the exhortation for the Saints to gather out from the wicked to the land of Zion. But they are always ready, when requested, to explain and defend the doctrine of plural marriage as held and practiced in Utah. So the people who receive the Gospel are not kept in the dark concerning polygamy. Neither do they emigrate for the purpose of supporting that system. If they think of it at all, it is more in the way of agent to the principles in theory, than of any expectation in regard to its practice. But the Press is greatly mistaken as to the class of converts to the "Mormon Church." It rarely includes a person who cannot read. The most potent "Mormon" missionary and one that is kept in the field more than any other, is called THE HOLY BIBLE, and it is chiefly the people who believe in and read that book—King James' translation—who receive the testimony of the "Mormon" Elders and come to Utah in the "Mormon" immigration companies. Conversation with the people who arrive at New York in charge of our Elders will prove the truth of these assertions. We also have works which are widely read, and our Church organ, THE MILLERIAN STAR, which is taken and read generally by the Latter-day Saints in Europe, has been published continuously for nearly fifty years, and keeps our scattered

people posted in regard to our Church doctrine, the doubts in Utah, the laws of Congress that relate to the "Mormon" question, and all things about which the Saints abroad are supposed by some people to be kept in ignorance. The Edmunds bill does not affect the "Mormon immigration" one way or another. There is no reason why it should. The "surprise" expressed in many quarters is the result of ignorance of the whole "Mormon" question, which the Press, we are sorry to see, shares in common with other papers and the general public. We respectfully recommend inquiry, and sincerely advise silence on the part of respectable journals until they can speak with some understanding of the subject.

## **ERRONEOUS DISPATCHES AND PRESS COMMENTS.** It is the fashion of many prominent newspapers in this country to comment on press dispatches concerning Utah and the "Mormons," as though the tidings borne by the telegraph were undisputed and indisputable facts, requiring no examination as to correctness. And yet there is no more unreliable news circulated through the land than these same green dispatches about Utah. Often they are whole-cloth falsehoods, frequently they contain just enough truth to save them from that imputation, and now and again by telling part only of the truth they succeed in misleading the public mind without getting fairly within the line of lying. A case in point is the dispatch concerning the circular letter of the First Presidency of the Church here, on the political situation. By making a partial quotation here and there from the document, and sandwiched in between the telegrapher's own remarks, a text has been furnished for long discourses from the press. We clip the annexed from a Boston paper as a specimen paragraph: The manifesto which the Mormon leaders have issued to their followers breathes a spirit of defiance and resistance to the execution of the Edmunds law. It describes the law as aimed at the repression and destruction of a portion of the Mormon religion; declares that the principle of celestial marriage is "interwoven with our dearest and holiest hopes connected with eternity," affirms that the Mormons have "no compromise to make or principles to barter away," and appeals to the Mormon people to guard well their franchise, and in one broken phalanx maintain and sustain their rights and the "Mormon resistance to, or evasion of, the Edmunds law, will only result in other legislation which cannot be resisted or evaded; and it is perhaps just as well that the Mormon spirit should manifest itself now as later. Now the "manifesto" contains not a syllable of "defiance," nor a breath of "resistance" to the Edmunds law or any other enactment. It is an outspoken declaration of the sentiments of the "Mormon" leaders on subjects upon which every American citizen has the right to speak, and so far from advising "resistance" or "defiance," it counsels the Latter-day Saints to submit not only to that law in relation to the approaching election, but also to the rules made by the Commissioners, although, in some respects, they are in excess of the law and the power it confers. It is a document that has been largely commended for its moderation and liberality by persons not in accord with the "Mormon" Church in any way, and can only be objected to in a spirit of unfairness and bigoted animosity. But the comments that have been made upon it, like the above, have been provided by the green report of it in the press dispatch, and the papers which have let themselves loose on the subject are to be blamed more for taking a one-sided and unreliable report as the ground for their attacks, than for the rabid nature of their remarks. We think that if the "Mormon" question is of sufficient importance to provoke frequent and serious attention, it is grave enough to demand inquiry into the facts before wholesale and bitter denunciation is indulged in. And we suggest that the "manifesto" which has called forth so many editorials should, at least have been read, before leading journals proceeded to load it down with so many epithets. However, one good thing will come out of this injustice. If the editors will not investigate before condemning other people will, and the very fierceness of the attacks made upon everything that is connected with "Mormonism" will direct the attention of inquiring people, who will read, think, see and act upon their own agency and responsibility. And their conclusions will be of the only kind to themselves, but to the system and people who are so unfairly assailed.

## **BY TELEGRAPH.** THE WESTERN UNION TELEGRAPH LINE. **AMERICAN.** LATEST TELEGRAPHIC DISPATCHES. Continued by Wire. **LITTLE ROCK, 23.**—A large fire broke out at Fort Smith last night. At last accounts over a dozen business places were consumed. **Groups of People Precipitated into Hanging River.** **PLAINFIELD, N. J., 23.**—It has been raining continuously for 24 hours and all the streams are much swollen. The streets are full of water and the damage to property is heavy. **At 1:30 p.m.** Grave Street bridge over the Greenbook in this city suddenly gave way while crowded with people watching the flood, and they were precipitated into the swollen stream. Six people were rescued, but it is believed a number perished. Both dams at Scotch Plains have washed out and the water is four feet deep in the streets of the city. **Floods in the Northwestern States.** **CHICAGO, 23.**—Specials from various points in the northwest report more or less heavy frosts in eastern Iowa, northern and central Illinois, and northern Indiana. In only few places was it heavy enough to materially injure the corn crop. **An Editor Nominated.** **NEWARK, N. J., 23.**—Special says A. B. Clark, editor of the Newark American, was nominated for Congress by the republicans of the congressional committee of the 10th district vice M. Churchill, resigned. **Criminal Cases on Lake Ontario.** **A Toronto special** says: Henry Gauvain, another survivor of the wrecked steamer Asia, reached here this morning. He says: I had my suspicions of the vessel and was very cautious. She was laden so that the fore part was thirty feet out of the water, while the stern sometimes plunged into the lake and she refused to obey her helm and rolled in the trough of the sea. Every strong puff of wind that came wheeled the fore part round until she actually moved as if on a pivot. More than a hundred people were on board, half French and half English, and all screaming at once. As the waves broke over the vessel, the officers could do nothing, the commands being unheeded. In the confusion, when it became evident that the vessel would go down, Gauvain, with a life preserver on, jumped into the water, followed by a woman and child who clung to him and shortly afterward the vessel disappeared. After being two hours in the water, and the lady went taken out by a smuggling vessel and carried to Collingwood. The lady's name is unknown. She appeared to be wealthy and gave Gauvain \$50 and also money to his smugglers. **Stranded Steamer.** **SEATTLE, N. Y., 23.**—The steamer Nappa, from North Shields, England, for Philadelphia, is ashore on Townsend Inlet Bar. **Call of Bonds.** **WASHINGTON, 23.**—A call will probably be issued this afternoon for \$25,000,000 of the extended five per cent. bonds. **Weeks Arrive.** **NEW YORK, 23.**—Wm. G. Rowson, telegraph operator on the Harlem road, at 93rd Street, and Conductor Root and Brakenham Robbins, of the wrecked New Haven train, have been arrested. Rowson is only 18 years old yet he holds the responsible position of managing all the trains of the company that run through the tunnel beneath 93rd and 95th Streets, his station being in the telegraph office at 93rd Street. The New Haven Company claims that Rowson should have been detained in the Harlem tunnel, and that he received a signal from 93rd Street. **ALABAMA IN WALL STREET.** **Follet and \$1,000,000 Missing.** **Alonso Follet,** a Wall Street broker, alleged to be short in his account, had not up to a late hour, visited his office. His absence filled the street with rumors of such a nature as to create a decided feeling of alarm among his customers, many of whom called and asked anxiously for him. To all inquiries the response given was that his arrival was expected. The clerk with hesitation said that he thought Mr. Follet was in town. The amount of the money now placed at not less than \$1,000,000. **Read Call.** **WASHINGTON, 23.**—The Secretary of the Treasury, this afternoon, issued a call for the redemption of bonds of the five per cent. funded loan of 1881, estimated at \$4,000,000, from Aug. 15, 1882. The \$25,000,000 and principal and interest to be paid at the treasury on the 23rd of December next and interest will cease on that day.

## **FOREIGN.** **Bonnec.** **CAIRO, 22.**—Prince Ibrahim Hamed and Kell, who signed the petition prepared by Arab Pasha last May for the Khedive's deposition, arrived today to pay their respects to the Khedive, who declined to receive them and they were ordered to quit the palace. **Calling out the Cavalry.** The Household Cavalry will make a demonstration to-morrow through the African quarters. Owing to the ruffianly conduct of the people, who make it uneasy for any European to pass the bazaar after dark. The behavior of the people in other quarters is quite friendly. **Governor Kief's Speech.** **ST. PETERSBURG, 22.**—The speech of Governor Kief against the Jews taken for signal by the general and minor officers in the provinces for the renewal of hostilities against the Israelites. **A Total Wreck.** **RONDEAU, 22.**—The steamer Picton, of the Quatre Bay Navigation Company's line, going up light from Toronto, went ashore at Rondeau Point on Wednesday and is a total wreck. She has been running between Port Dalhousie and Toronto, but was going up light from Rondeau Point and South Star, on the line where the Asia was wrecked. She had no passengers. The vessel was valued at \$25,000; insured for \$10,000. **Abdallah's Black.** **ALEXANDRIA, 23.**—Gen. Wood, on his march to Damietta, reached Chibin last evening and was to remain until this morning. The railway is blocked by deserters from Abdallah's camp. Gen. Wood telegraphed that Abdallah's troops continue to desert, and that of 7,000 of the original force only 800 remain. They plundered the barracks, the Governor's house, and many private residences and exchanged. **Concentrating at Cairo.** **CAIRO, 23.**—Gen. McPherson and staff arrived last night. The Indian troops leave Zagazig to-night to march thither. **The Grand Steamer Deposed.** **ALEXANDRIA, 23.**—It is officially announced from Jeddah that the Grand Steamer of Mexico has been deposed and imprisoned at Taif, where Midhat Pasha is a prisoner. Abdallah Abrehan has been named Grand Cherif. He is brother to the Cherif who was deposed by order of the Sultan because he was favorable to the British. **Manged.** **ALEXANDRIA, 23.**—Two men implicated in the massacre were hanged today. **Heavy Failures.** **DUBLIN, 23.**—The failure is reported of a commercial firm of long standing, name not given; the liabilities are estimated at £100,000 to £200,000. **Lake.** It is understood that the firm reported failed is that of Geo. Reed & Co., distillers. **Capture of Abdallah.** **DAMIETTA, 23.**—Gen. Woods, with two regiments, arrived at Damietta today. Abdallah surrendered at the railway station. The troops are expected to surrender their arms this afternoon. The surrounding country is quiet and crops in splendid condition. **The Greeks.** **CONSTANTINOPLE, 23.**—Count Corti, Italian ambassador, has invited the representatives of the Powers to a conference on Sunday to discuss the Greek question. **The Black Garrison Fighting with Plunder and Ammunition.** **DAMIETTA, 23.**—The negro garrison is surrendering, and taking besides their plunder a quantity of arms and ammunition.

**English Strikers.**  
**LONDON, 23.**—Six thousand miners in North Staffordshire have given notice of a demand for an advance of 10 per cent. in their wages. **Intimidating the Strikers.**  
**CAIRO, 23.**—British cavalry marched through the city today for the purpose of making a demonstration to intimidate the natives and prevent disorders in the Arab quarters.

## **BRIEF TELEGRAMS.** **A heavy storm along the Hudson River did much damage yesterday.** **Ex-Lieutenant Geo. L. Rousseau, of Texas, yesterday shot himself through the head, killing himself instantly.** **The large steam mill of G. L. Edward & Son, at Chester, Pennsylvania, burned yesterday. Loss, \$80,000; insurance, \$60,000.** **The locomotive engineers of the system west of the Mississippi threaten to strike and stop every wheel except those of the Watson and enough to carry the mails on the other lines.** **The threatened war on rates to northwestern points between four of the greater roads in the Iowa pool has been averted, and they today signed a passenger and freight agreement.**

## **DIED.** **In the 12th Ward, Salt Lake City, on Friday, September 22, 1882, at 5 minutes to 1 o'clock, of dropsy of the heart, SARAH ANN HOPKINS.** Deceased was born at Philadelphia, July 4, 1811. She was consequently aged 71 years, 2 months and 18 days. She was baptized into the Church in 1830, and went to Nauvoo in 1841, passing through many troublous times in the early history of the Church; and was with her husband to Utah in 1850, where she has since resided. Deceased was a kind and affectionate mother, a true wife and a faithful Latter-day Saint, and leaves a numerous posterity, and a host of friends to mourn her loss. Funeral from the 12th Ward Assembly Hall to-morrow, Sunday, at 2 p.m. Friends of the family are cordially invited to attend. **JAMES THOMAS EDWARDS,** son of Chas. Edwards, of the 11th Ward. Born December 20, 1851, died this a.m. at 7 o'clock, from the effects of injuries received from the falling of a tree, August 23, while working on the Denver & Rio Grande Railroad. Owing to the absence of a brother of the deceased, the time of the funeral has not yet been determined. **In Provo City, September 21st, 1882, of old age, HENRY McFARLANE,** aged 80 years, 7 months and 7 days. Deceased embraced the Gospel in Edinburgh, Scotland, being baptized by the late Elder Orion Pratt, on October 18th, 1848. During the next twenty years he labored in various parts of Scotland spreading the principles of the Gospel which he had embraced, and became a humble instrument in converting and baptizing many. He was immigrated to Utah and settled in Provo, where he lived the life of a consistent Latter-day Saint. He died surrounded by all the members of his family now living.
