#### LEGISLATIVE.

Jan. 22, 1869.

**COUNCIL.**—Council met pursuant to adjournment.

A communication from Le Grand Young, Esq., acknowledging the tender of the freedom of the Council Chamber, was received and read.

Councilor Harrington, Chairman of the Committee on Judiciary, to whom was referred C. F. No. 3, reported the bill back amended, which was read and, on motion of Councilor Callister, the same was referred to the Committee on Revenue, with instructions to consider the propriety of consolidating all laws and parts of laws on the subject with requisite amendments on the bill.

Adjourned till 10 a.m. on Monday.

**HOUSE.**—House met at ten a.m.

The Committee on Judiciary reported back a bill entitled "An act regulating service on foreign corporations and non-residents."

The Committee on Municipal corporations and Town sites reported back the petition of the Mayor and City Council of Beaver City, and deemed legislation thereon unnecessary.

The Committees on Claims and Appropriations were instructed to incorporate in the Territorial appropriation bill the sum of one thousand dollars to be offered as premiums by the Agricultural Society to pay premiums on stock; also five hundred dollars for the purpose of holding a fair where stock, produce and home manufactures may be exhibited.

The Committee on Revenue, to whom was recommended the bill for an act appropriating money for the purpose of importing improved kinds of sheep, reported back a substitute bill entitled "An act pertaining to sheep which was passed."

The Council adjourned. An act regulating service on foreign corporations and non-residents, was passed.

Adjourned till the 25th inst., at 10 a.m.
