'Phones for Farmers-The Bell Téle Thomes for Farmers—The Beil Tele-phone companies throughout the coud-try have been making it a point to encourage farmers, and country people generally to install telephone connec-tions in this way. The farmers cut their own poles and set them, so that all that it costs them is teaming and labor. Then they have the wire sod inune labor. Then they buy the wire and insulators from the companies at just about cost price, and then they own the line themselves.
