

# SHOCKING DEATH ON THE RAIL

Unknown Youth Cut to Pieces  
Under Freight Train  
West of Ogden.

## LOVE LORN YOUTH SUICIDES.

Alvin Monrad of Salt Lake Takes Poison in a Roominghouse—District Court—News Briefs.

Ogden, Oct. 9.—A westbound freight train yesterday morning struck a young man about 17 years of age, killing him instantly, at a point near Lemay siding about 40 miles west of Ogden. It is presumed the young man was either jumping along the track or tried to jump the moving train and was caught beneath the wheels. Both his legs were cut off and both his arms were broken. He was only about 17 years of age and was apparently a foreigner. But there was absolutely nothing on the boy or in his clothing to give any clue as to his identity. The corpse was found by a shatterer of a musical instrument, but what it was he could not tell. The terribly mangled body of the unfortunate youth was brought to Ogden and will be buried here under the direction of the hospital officials, as the accident occurred in that county.

## LOVE LORN YOUTH SUICIDES.

Remains of Alvin Monrad of Salt Lake Found in Roominghouse.

Ogden, Oct. 9.—The decomposing body of a man identified as Alvin Monrad of Salt Lake, was found last evening in a roominghouse at the rear of Electric alley by the police. It is the only theory upon which the police have been working and it is very evident that the man was dependent over a love affair and ended his own existence, as various things found in the room bear silent testimony to such a deed. The man had been dead at least five days. A glass containing two solutions of cyanide and a bottle containing the same poison were found on a stand at the side of his bed.

It was learned that he had become infatuated with one of the daughters of a local family and wanted to marry her. After the body was removed a letter was discovered addressed to him by Nellie Reardon, the woman whom he wanted to marry. This letter revealed his name as Alvin Monrad. In the letter she said that she did not wish to marry him. He is 15, he was 27. On this letter he is indorsed in his own handwriting: "I love her with all my heart and soul. God forgive me for this deed." It evidently referred to his intended suicide. He signed the name of Alvin Monrad, and below appended an address, "Mrs. A. Swenson, 663 North Third East street, Salt Lake." This is probably the address of a relative, and the Salt Lake police were accordingly notified.

## DISTRICT COURT.

Weapons Handed Down by Judge Howell in Civil Cases.

Ogden, Oct. 9.—In the district court yesterday Judge Howell handed down the following decisions: In the case of Sarah Williams Christensen vs. Susannah Williams, a suit in which the plaintiff sought to set aside a deed to certain real estate belonging to her father, for the reason that her father and efforts had secured the property to the father's estate and the deceased had deeded the same to the defendant, regardless of the plaintiff's equity, the court ruled the issues in favor of the defendant. The plaintiff had built up and by her labor had contributed the funds to buy property, but the court ruled that the deed from the father to the defendant carried the title.

In the suit of the Utah and Oregon Lumber company against James and Annie Varney to foreclose under a mechanic's lien, the court found the issues in favor of the plaintiff. In the case of Dan Pugh against the Oregon Short Line, in which the plaintiff recently secured a verdict for \$150 in costs for the killing of a horse, the defendant's motion for a new trial was denied. The testimony in this case shows that the horse dropped in between the ties in a bridge that was not properly protected and that in order to remove it the railroad men took an ax and chopped its legs off and rolled the body over into the river.
