

FOREIGN NOTES.

More visitors attend the Vienna Exposition on Sunday than any other day.

Yellow fever is so wide-spread and virulent at Montevideo that a great part of the population have fled.

A daughter of Count Ceccopieri, of Carrara, recently set her clothes on fire from her cigarette and burned to death.

It is stated that the daughter of Toole, the English comedian—a child of seven years—has inherited her father's dramatic genius.

The population of London is 3,355,072; Liverpool, 505,274; Glasgow, 498,462; Manchester, 354,057; Dublin, 314,666; Edinburgh, 208,553.

The number of primary schools in Germany is said to be 60,000, and the number of pupils in them 6,000,000, between the ages of six and fourteen.

It was mentioned by one of the English sporting journals that the owner of Doncaster had invested enough money at fifty to one to bring him some £40,000.

It is in contemplation to hold a great indignation meeting in London on the subject of the Confessional, which is rapidly working its way in the Church of England.

Mr. George Odger, the English republican, has been judged an involuntary bankrupt, being unable to pay the costs of an unsuccessful suit he brought against the London Figaro.

The Emperor of China has decided not to give audience to foreign ministers unless they kneel while in his imperial presence. This they will not do, and there is but little hope of a compromise.

A curious wedding took place at Rushall Church recently. Each of the happy pair had wooden legs, and their acquaintance originated in the Walsall Cottage Hospital, of which they were inmates.

Lord Derby, in a recent letter, is very severe on Englishmen for their senseless extravagance in foreign travel. But his Lordship adds that the American tourists are even more ridiculous than the English.

The *Overland China Mail* states that the murderer of San-ko-lin-sin in 1865 has been discovered and arrested. He is to be cut to pieces, and his heart is to be offered at San-ko-lin-sin's ancestral hall, "to display the justice of the laws of the Empire."

"The drain of emigrants to America," says the *Limerick Reporter*, "is absolutely alarming. The people are leaving the country in crowds; a respectable, well-dressed, intelligent, and orderly population are abandoning their native country in countless numbers."

Captain Humphrey, the winner of the Queen's Prize, in 1871, has just won the Prince of Wales's Challenge Cup, shot for annually by members of the Cambridge University Rifle Corps. He made one hundred points, and last year was third with 103 in the same competition.

Gen. Von Moltke's wife is an English woman, the step-daughter of his sister. When the General was in Constantinople he wrote letters to his sister, which so interested the step-daughter that she entered into correspondence with him herself, and finally married him.

Edmund Yates describes Leon Gambetta as a fat, gross man of middle height, with reddish brown complexion and decidedly red nose, with a queer louche or cock-eye, which gives him a half jovial, half sinister expression. He wears a curly-brimmed, grease-stained hat, a tortoise-shell double-eye-glass hanging loose round his neck, shining coat and full trousers, into the pockets of which his hands are thrusts up to the wrists.

Pere Hyacinthe has organized a society of over twelve hundred Liberal Catholics, whose avowed object is "to combat the Ultramontane doctrines," and while acknowledging, in a certain sense, the supremacy of the Pope, they hold themselves at liberty to appoint their own Bishop. The Pere has not yet accepted the formal charge of this parish, as he considers his mission a higher one—namely, the reformation of the Papal Church at large.

— The New York gamin amuses himself by dropping lighted matches in street letter-boxes.

— Mr. Goschen, one of the Lords of the Admiralty, lately narrowly escaped being killed by the accidental discharge of a rifle at the Portsmouth Dockyard.

— Lord Clifton, son of the Earl of Darnley, not having done his schooling, has sensibly declined to be the Conservative candidate for M.P. from Rochester, England.

— The Chicago *Inter-Ocean* is making an effort to inaugurate excursions for the poor children of Chicago, after the system of those inaugurated in the New York *Times* for the children of that city.

— At the prevailing rate of the increase of crime it would seem to be a possibility to be seriously contemplated that the murderers may be able at no distant day to out-vote the unmurdered and abolish capital punishment.—*Washington Star*.

— Said Landor, "I have no ailments, but why should I? I have eaten well-prepared food; I have drunk light sub-acid wines, and three glasses instead of ten; I have liked modest better than immodest women, and I have never tried to make a shilling in the world."

— The Russian Legation at Rome has issued a notice that all objects sent to the Empress of Russia will be refused. That determination was taken in consequence of two hundred packets and more than six thousand petitions having been sent to the Embassy in three days. So don't send the Empress anything.

— That same old negro has dug up another pot containing \$17,000 in gold that was buried during the war near Savannah. He thinks about five or six more "finds" of this kind and he will retire from the watermelon business and enjoy life—have liver and ice-cream three times a day, and all that.

— The effort at harmoniously blending the white and colored elements at Nashville can hardly be called a success, judging from a late result. It is a boy. He is half black and half white, not in the mulatto sense, but the lower half of his body is whiter than ordinary white folks, while the upper half is black as midnight. On the top of his head is a little patch of straight silken hair, surrounded by kinky negro wool.

I., saw Hannah Green jump into the river to drown herself because she had "no home, no friends, and no nothing," he forgot his years and infirmities and jumped in after her; and she—poor girl—was obliged to abandon all idea of drowning herself in trying to keep him from being drowned. — Tynemouth, in England, is a borough that has good reason to boast of its health. In May, there was so little sickness that the fees taken at the cemetery were not sufficient to meet the ordinary working expenses. Its seaport, North Shields, is a model town, the streets are kept clean, and the sewers washed out with salt water. An inspector of nuisances, aided by the police and a staff of assistants, is made responsible for keeping away epidemics. It costs a little more for taxes than in other places, but the lives of a host of young children are saved thereby, and the workmen reap the fruit of their labors in clean and comfortable homes.
