Who Qualify as Citizens Before the Majority of Officers

ARE ENTITLED TO THE FRANCHISE.

The Wife of a Non-Citizen May Be Entitled to the Franchise
An Opinion from H. C. Attorney General.

Attorney General A. C. Bishop has transmitted to J. H. Jaschinski, county attorney of Sanpete county, the following opinion affecting the status of wives and children of naturalized citizens entitled to the franchise:

Dear Sir: In view of your favor of the 19th inst., in which you ask me to advise you concerning the wife of a non-citizen, I have examined the records of the office to such an extent as will adequately cover the subject, and at the same time greatly shorten the time required for a complete answer. The wife of a non-citizen, in my judgment, is entitled to the franchise, inasmuch as she is a citizen of the United States, and the wife of a naturalized citizen, and the wife of a naturalized citizen is entitled to the franchise.

SECTION 1094, title 39, chapter 4, of the Revised Statutes of the United States, 1890, provides:

"The children of persons who have been duly naturalized under any law of the United States, or who, previous to the passing of any law, were naturalized by the laws of any of the United States, may have the rights of citizens of the United States to be exercised in the United States, so far as may be consistent with the naturalization of such persons."

It will be observed from these two sections that by virtue of the naturalization of the husband, the wife is entitled to the franchise, and the children of persons who have been duly naturalized under any law of the United States, or who, previous to the passing of any law, were naturalized by the laws of any of the United States, may have the rights of citizens of the United States to be exercised in the United States, so far as may be consistent with the naturalization of such persons.

There is a distinction, however, between citizenship and that of an alien. Citizenship is determined by the law of Congress; the right to vote is determined by the law of the state where the franchise is to be exercised.

SECTION 2 of Article 4 of the Constitution in relation to elections and the qualifications of voters prescribes that the qualifications of voters shall be the same throughout the United States.

SECTION 5 of the said article provides:

"No person shall be denied a qualified elector of this State, unless such person is a citizen of the United States."

SECTION 6 of the said article provides:

"No person shall be denied the elective franchise, unless restricted to civil rights shall be permitted to vote at any election or be eligible to hold any office of trust or profit."
