that women perform the hardest kind of labor in Germany, but was not prepared for the sights I have witnessed to-day in Vienna. In witnessed to-day in Vienna. In America mixing mortar and carry ing the hod is considered such hard work that few white men can be found willing to undertake it at the present day. An immense building near our hotel, occupying a whole block, is in course of erec-tion, on which not less than 400 persons are employed, fully 200 o' whom are women. All the hard laboring work is done by women, such as making and carrying mor-tar in buckets on their heads to the workmen, and handling the brick. They are not allowed a moment's leisure, several overseers being on workmen, and handling the brick. They are not allowed a moment's leisure, several overseers being on guard to keep them constantly in motion. We found the same pro-portion of women at work on all new buildings, and there must be many thousands of them to-day doing this species of laboring work in Vienna. They are young, mid-die aged, and old, but all seem to be strong and healthy. At dinner time they swarm into the shops to purchase a piece of brown bread, and eat their dinner sitting on the curb-stones. The wages is one and eat their dinner sitting on the curb-stones.
