A GRATIFYING INCREASE.

#### Coal Production of Rocky Mountain Field Has Increased 267 per Cent.

In a write-up of the coal production of the United States during the past year, Mines and Minerals says: The largest gains in point of tonnage were made by the Appalachian field, which shows war. an increase of 12,653,302 short tons, or 9.7 per cent over 1899, and of 87,304,174 tons or 158 per cent over 1887. The next largest increase in 1900 over 1899 was in the Central field, which in-creased 2,176,917 short tons, or 6.6 per cent over the preceding year. 1887 to 1900 the Central field has From creased from 14.478,883 to 35,358,164 tons, a gain of 20,879,281 tons, or 144 per cent. The Western field increased 2,129,135 short tons, or 14 per cent, over 1899. As compared with 1887 however, the Western field has not shown the amount of percentage of increase exhibited by the Sentral and Rock Mountain fields. The Rocky Mountain states have increased

same time from 3,646,280 to 13,n the 398,556 short tons, or 267 per cent. So far as the ratio of increase is concerned, however, all of these regions fall into insignificance when compared with that of the Northern field, which embraces the coal-producing area of Michigan. This field in 1887 produced only 71,461 short tons. During the last three or four years extensive developments have been in progress, and in 1900 the out put reached \$49,475 tons, a gain of 778,-014 tons, or 1,089 per cent.

### RETURNS FROM COCONIO.

Quil Nebeker Says the Company has Started to Sink on Fissure Veins.

Supt. 'Quil Nebeker of the Coconino Mining company, returned yesterday from the company's property in north-ern Arlzona, on which a 100-ton leach-

ing plant is being crected. The build-ings have been completed, but the difficulty in securing the machinery will delay the completion of the plant for at least two months. The development of the fissure veins

in the company's property in Grand canyon has been decided on, and Mr. Nebeker says a small force has been put to work sinking on the veins, one of which is said to be fully 100 feet wide where it outcrops on the surface.
