A liquor descer is a per-son who sells spirituous and fermented liquers, or either, not to be drunk at the place of sale. A wine dealer is a person who sells wine exclusively. A beer saloon keeper is a person who sells beer, ale and porter. A distiller is a person who manu-factures spirituous liquors, *Provided* that the same shall not be sold to be drunk on the premises without first obtaining a license as a dram or tippling shop keeper. A brewer is a person who manufactures fermented liquors. Bec 3. Application for a license under this Ordinance shall be made in writing to the Mayor and shall state where the busi-mess is to be carried on. No application shall be considered unless accompanied by a petition, signed by a majority of the tax-

He shall faithe fully observe and keep all Ordinances in force in relation to liquor, during the pe-riod of such license; he shall not keep open his bar, house, or place for the sale of such fiquors, nor sell, give away, or in any manner deal in, by himself, servant or other person, any spirituous or fermented liquor between the hours of 11 p. m. and 4 a. m. on any day of the weak; he shall prohibit all gaming, with or without bet-ting by means of cards, dominoes, dice or ether articles, and every game of chance. And on the proclamation of the Mayor for all liquor establishments to be closed, he shall discontinue business during the peri-od of such Proclamation; he shall not in any wise dispose of liquors to any per-son under sixteen years of age, nor to any Indian; he shall prohibit music, dancing, drunkenness and s.l riotous or disorderly conduct on his premises.

Sec. 8.—If any person shall keep any house or place within the corporate limits of this City for the purpose of manufactur-ing, selling or otherwise disposing of spirituous or formented liquors, or shall manufacture, sell or otherwise dispose of spirituous or formented liquors, without first having obtained a license therefor, as provided in this Ordinance, on conviction thereof, he shall forfelt and pay a fine of one hundred dollars for the first offence; and if convicted of a second offence, a fine of one hundred dollars and imprisonment for thirty days; and for a third or any subse-quent conviction, a fine of one hundred dollars and imprisonment for the term of six mcn hs. aix menths.

Sec. 9.—Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance for which no penalty is herein provided shall forfeit and pay a fine of fifty dollars for each offence. Sec. 10.
