LOCAL BRIEFS.

Architect Ulmer expects to have the L. D. S. hospital ready for occupancy by Dec. 1.

George H. Booth, formerly of London, now of this city, has been admitted to citizenship by Judge Morse.

The state board of education granted a state high school diploma yesterday afternoon, to Principal J. O. Cross of the Wasatch school.

There will be no "Milkmaid's Convention" matinee Saturday afternoon, but there will be the regular performance that evening, in the First Presbyterian church.

Vice President Hancock and General Superintendent Bucknoff left last evening with Mr. Schuff and party for the west, over the Laramie cut-off, by moonlight.

There was but one lone, torn candidate at yesterday's examination for the position of drainage engineer under the civil service, although the job is considered a very desirable one.

The management of the Harriman lines has ordered 190 locomotives from the Baldwin at Philadelphia, and 50 engines have been ordered from the same firm for the Los Angeles road.

The Short Line has let a contract for the extension of the Boise branch up to the river to Twin Springs, 56 miles northeast of the capital city, to open up the rich lumber district in that part of the state.

The city library committee and J. Q. Packard have been discussing the matter of having the children's reading room of the new library building on the first floor, and amending provision made for the accommodation of this department.

The local friends of E. L. Carpenter, formerly with the Utah Fuel company of this city, will be pleased to learn that he has been placed in charge of the New York offices of the Consolidation, Fairmount and Somerset coal companies.

A. S. Erickson is back from Monticello, Nov., where he went to represent his brother, J. A. Erickson whose sheep had been attached by the owner of a spring where the sheep had been watering, to secure toll for the same. The suit was compromised.

Owing to the fact that the county commissioners have been so busy since election, canvassing the returns, they have not yet passed upon the bills of the registrars and judges of election, but will do so in time for them to receive their pay on the first of December.

The local postoffice is the recipient daily now of damaged mail of all kinds from the Asusa wreck on the Union Pacific. Some of the mail is so disfigured that the directions cannot be made out, and is sent here on a guess. Postmaster Thomas thinks quite a lot of mail matter for Salt Lake people was destroyed in that disaster.

Owing to the growing importance of the sheep industry in Utah, the B. H. Harris Wool company of St. Louis has found it necessary to open a branch office in Salt Lake, it is being fitted up at room 207 News building, with A. S. Erickson, a local man, in charge. In the future their wool trade in the west will be handled here instead of at St. Louis.

"It is gratifying," said Manager Lewis of the Deseret News book store, "to see the demand for good books that springs up after events like Mr. Roosevelt's introduction of Charles Wagner. We laid in a large supply of 'The Making of an American' and 'The Simple Life,' but the demand yesterday was so lively that it looks as though we would have to telegraph for a new supply."

Mrs. Thomas Belliston, widow of the Short Line switchman who was killed in the local yards last June, died yesterday afternoon, of typhoid fever, leaving six orphaned children, the youngest being a babe in arms. The remains will be shipped today, to Nephi for interment. Mr. Belliston was a member of the Switchmen's union and of several secret fraternities which have cared for his family since his death.

General Agent Warren of the Santa Fe route has received copies of a new shipping directory for the system. This directory includes the names and addresses of all the merchants and shippers doing business along the various lines and branches of the Santa Fe system, with maps of every state in the Union, and a varied assortment of such data as would be likely to be of value in such a publication. The directory has nearly 400 pages, and is quite a pretentious affair.

Edward F. Stolzenberger, who was some time ago made defendant in a branch of promissory suit filed by Ames Brink, was married last evening to Miss Mary B. Donovan, formerly of this city but now of San Francisco. The bride is well known in this city, having been a clerk in the county recorder's office for about four years. She just recently returned to this city from San Francisco. The case against Mr. Stolzenberger was dismissed on Monday by Judge Morse, at Mrs. Brink's expense.

The street railway management is making extensive repairs all along the lines of the local system in preparation for winter. This includes ballasting with heavy gravel which will prevent any sinking of the track, such as occurred last winter and gave so much trouble. The new track on Ninth East between Sixth and Seventh South streets has been completed, and the overhead plant will be installed the coming week, so that the Fourth South street cars can run to Seventh South street.

State Engineer A. F. Doremus and Attorney F. S. Richards returned last evening from Cache county, where they addressed a meeting of farmers and water users at Clifton on the government water proposition. The part which particularly interests the northern Utah farmers is the utilization of Bear lake for reservoir purposes, and the Salt Lake project, where they intend to find the farmers so unanimous in favor of the movement to consolidate all of the water interests into one association, which can deal most efficaciously with the government.

Rev. J. C. Freund, the new rabbi of the Congregation B'nai Brith, who will arrive here next week, has been the pastor of a congregation at Toledo, O., for the last four years. He is a native of New York City, aged 29, a graduate

ELECTRIC SIGNS ARE A NUISANCE.

Chief of Fire Department Wants City Council to Regulate Them.

THEY STICK TOO FAR OUT.

Sidewalk Grade on Second and O to Be Restored—Water Meter at State Prison.

The committee on streets of the city council last evening considered the communication from Chief Bywater of the fire department, calling attention to the danger of the large electric signs which are hung from a number of buildings in the business district. He said that they extended too far out from the buildings, and in case of fire it would be almost impossible to put a ladder up to the buildings. One sign on East First South street, he said, extended out 11 feet from the building. The committee was of the opinion that they should be regulated and kept within proper bounds for public safety and the chief will consult with the city attorney and draw up an ordinance covering the matter, which will probably be submitted to the council Monday night.

The petition of the Brigham Young Cemetery association, asking that its taxes be remitted, was considered by the committee, and after some discussion, was referred to the city attorney for an opinion as to whether the city has the legal right to remit the tax.

TO RESTORE GRADE.

The committee on streets will accompany Assistant City Engineer Zulich tomorrow to Second and O streets to see what can be done towards restoring the sidewalk grade to its former condition. When the new sidewalk was laid on that corner to the permanent grade there was a cut in the grade of about five feet, leaving the corner down in a hole that depth and making it necessary for the residents on the corner to use ladders to reach their property. It is probable that the grade will be filled in about half-way between the present and the former grade.

WATER METER AT PRISON.

Upon the recommendation of Supt. of Waterworks Hines, the committee on waterworks has decided to authorize the installation of a water meter at the state prison. It is claimed that the prison is using about five or six times as much water as it is entitled to, and hence a meter will be put in to measure it.
