MUNICIPAL MATTERS.

Nothing Startling at the Council Meeting Last Evening.

A DISCUSSION ON DICTIONARIES.

The Report on the Petition of Barnes and Byrne Reconsidered—Petitions and Communications—Report of City Officers.

Last night's session of the City Council was an extremely short one. Nothing extraordinary was brought up, and aside from a short discussion on dictionaries, all went on harmoniously. Below is a report of the proceedings:

PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS.

Wm. White petitioned for permission to lay down water pipe down private alley on North East, between Second and Third South. Committee on Waterworks.

J. H. Dally asked that Laura Galt be allowed to redeem certain property from tax sale. Referred to attorney.

Pearl Green asked for release from tax sale of lot 19, block 3, West Broadway. O. M. Lane filed a similar petition. Granted on recommendation of city attorney.

H. B. Pollock asked for relief from tax sale. Referred to city attorney.

Walter K. Perkins petitioned for exemption from payment of taxes on city owned property. Referred to city attorney.

The North Plains Irrigation company, by their attorney Arthur Parsons, presented a petition for the cancellation of a deed in canal. Referred.

REPORT OF CITY OFFICERS.

The city attorney is reporting on the petition of Mary J. Scott asking for a reduction in cost of tax in property in West Avenue addition. Recommended that a quit claim deed be issued upon payment of the taxes and costs without interest.

On recommendation of the committee, Josephine G. Smith, asking for release of property from tax sale made for sidewalk on South Temple, was allowed a quit claim deed upon paying \$20.00 and costs of sale without interest.

The petition of Gertrude Y. Hampton asking for compensation for alleged damages to goods and waste along the line of the city sewer, by reason of the construction thereof was upon recommendation of the city attorney not granted. The same attorney recommended that the petition of Mary Ann Frost asking for a rebate on her bill tax, be not granted, and the petition of E. H. Ayers, asking for release of tax sale, was granted in accordance with the prayer of the petitioners.

The city engineer recommended that the standard of measures be recommended by the city engineer be referred to the committee on public grounds. Referred to committee on public grounds.

COMMISSIONER OF CLIMATE.

Health Commissioner Dally reported that the Chamber of Commerce had guaranteed \$500 to World's Champion of Climatology. Received and filed.

The superintendent of waterworks called attention to the condition of the embankment on the south side of the Parley's canyon reservoir and recommended that it be repaired for \$100,000, which would cost about \$200,000. Referred to the waterworks committee and city engineer.

The committee on streets recommended that the petition of C. H. McGregor asking for the grading of Eighth West between North Temple and Fourth North, be not granted.

The petition of Wm. G. Gifford, asking that the filling up of the Eighth West canal be continued, was not granted. The committee on streets feeling that too much money had already been expended in that direction.

THE WARM SPRINGS LEASE.

The committee on public grounds to whom was referred the petition of Barnes and Byrne asking for certain modifications of their lease on the Warm Springs property, recommended that the lease be renewed for a period of ten years, and for an extension of five years.
