

THEATRE.—Last night there was a large audience at the Theatre, and it must have been very gratifying to Mr. Hardie to see such a goodly number of his friends on the occasion of his benefit. The performance was a complete success. The drama of "A Wolf in Sheep's Clothing" is a splendid piece, and judging from the manifestations of approval its presentation called forth, it will become one of the standard favorites at the Theatre. Miss Lockhart, as Ann Carey, has never appeared to greater advantage before a Salt Lake audience; her personation of this character was excellent. Mr. Lindsay, as the brutal leader of "Kirk's Lamps," Mr. Hardie as Jasper Carrow, Mr. Margetta as the jealous bumpkin Chedney, Mrs. A. Clawson as Kediah, Mrs. Irving as Della Carey, all played excellently, and it is seldom that we have seen a piece so well played or receive such hearty plaudits as this.

The poem of "Mary Queen of Scots" was recited by Miss Lockhart, in her peculiar quiet and impressive manner; the historical tableaux were beautiful, and added much to the effect of the recitation. The drama of "Wallace the Hero of Scotland" was played with considerable snap, and seemed to please the audience very well. At the close of the performance Mr. Hardie was called before the curtain, and briefly expressed his thanks. To-night Mr. Lindsay's piece, the "Shin-dawn," will be repeated.

NO MATES.—We learn from Mr. Theo. F. Fryer, Wells Fargo's agent, that a mail was expected at the Terminus this evening from the blocked portion of the road East; but this morning a telegram was received stating that the road was worse blocked than ever, owing to another snow storm, or the drifting of the snow by the wind. This is peculiarly unfortunate, and we suppose will defer sine die, all reasonable hope of the arrival of mail matter from the East.

PROVO.—A correspondent writing from Provo, on the 3rd instant, says: "The county seat of Utah Co. is looking up. It is two years last Autumn since I was here, and I notice more improvement in the appearance of the place since that time than in the eight years previous. The city is being extended and the 'bench' east of the city, is being built up, and I believe will yet become the business part of the town. Many new picket fences are being built, which are a decided improvement on the primitive style of rail or brush fence. Speaking of improvements, Provo now sports a barber shop, which cannot be said of any of the settlements I have visited south of here, and the gentlemanly young 'knights of the razor,' ready to tonsure his customers on the shortest notice, fills up his spare time in playing marbles. There is less whisky drinking carried on here at present than was wont to be in the past. Story of Provo, most persons of liberal tendencies, having either reformed or moved away to some other place; or perhaps their abstinence may be from necessity, as I understand there is no whisky sold here at present except for medicinal purposes, and those selling would be apt to suspect something if a person should be taken 'sick' too often. I believe the people are also improving intellectually, as they have lectures once a week upon different topics. Indeed the people throughout the whole county are feeling well and the settlements are in a flourishing condition."

CO-OPERATION IN TOOELE CO.—Bro. H. S. Gowans, of Tooele City, writes us that the Co-operative movement is being taken hold of by the people generally of Tooele City and county. Societies have been formed in the principle settlements and in a very short time the stores will be in active operation. It is gratifying to hear from almost all parts of the Territory, of the readiness of the people to follow out the counsels given on this subject; the only wonder is that this principle was not more generally adopted years ago, seeing that it affects, so materially, the pecuniary interests of the masses of the people.
