CONGRESSIONAL.

SENATE.

The senate resumed consideration of the resolution of inquiry into the alleged sale of arms to the French government; and Morton, having the floor, continued his speech commenced yesterday. He repeated the assertion that Schurz remained in the republican party for the purpose of defeating it, and was in affiliation with the Missouri liberal convention, and said it was a democratic document. He asked Schurz whether since the commencement of this congress he (Schurz) had voted with the republican party in the senate on any political question? Schurz said he had voted for the amendment. Morton showed he did not vote on the bill at all, after it was amended, and said Schurz stood with the democrats in favor of universal amnesty, which was not a republican measure. Morton continued at length to criticize Schurz' political course, insisting that for a long time he had been in opposition to the republican party. Morton discussed the question of the sale of arms, and said the resolution now reported to public gaze was a warning most unwholesome odors from the untruthful character of the preamble and its hostile purpose.

EUROPEAN DISPATCHES.

LONDON, 21.—The press directory gives the number of papers in Great Britain at 1,456.

Five hundred weight of gunpowder was seized at Cork by the authorities.

PARIS, 21.—A bill has been introduced in the assembly, to increase the powers of the government over the press.

Three of the assassins of General Le-Compte and Thomas will be executed at 9 a.m. at Salaz.

Thiers has summoned the principal generals to give an account of the present state of feeling in the army.

ROME, 21.—The pope has asked England and Austria for a meeting of the Ecumenical Council in their dominions.

BERLIN, 21.—The police are informed that a man is concealed in this city who has sworn to kill Bismarck, and active search is making for him.

EASTERN DISPATCHES.

NEW YORK, 21.—The boards of trade petition the United States Senate asking action on the bill already passed by the House for the repeal of the duty on tea and coffee. Proceedings have been commenced to throw into involuntary bankruptcy all the insurance companies in this district which are unable to meet their Chicago losses.

INDIANAPOLIS, 21.—The hotels are crowded with delegates to the Republican national convention at Philadelphia, met here to-day, and was the largest ever held in the State. Resolutions were unanimously adopted expressing renewed confidence in the President and Vice-President, and faith in the future of the Republican party.

WASHINGTON, 21.—The convention of the District of Columbia have elected two delegates, one colored, to the Philadelphia convention. Resolutions were passed endorsing Grant and Colfax.

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
