The summons came without warning. His remains were brought here for burial, the funeral being held at the Lindon meetinghouse on the 5th. Mr. White was born in Chittenden county. Vt., March 5. 1836. He moved with his parents when a child to Ohio, where the family joined the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and moved to Nauvoo, IIL, sharing in the hardships incident to the history of the Church at that time. His failer died at Nauvoo, and the family left the state in 1846, settling at Council Bluffs. Evander and an older brother, with their widowed mother, crossed the plains in 1852, and made their home in Pleasant Grove. Mr. White in later years assisted the hand cart companies in crossing the plains, also helped guard the people against Indian detre-dation, going on two expeditions through the southern part of the state. He leaves a wife and several children to cherish his memory. Deceased was an indefatigable worker in the upbuilding of this commonwealth and a faithful member of the Church Two of the inmates of the state in-dustrial school, Henry Sorensen and Edward Nielson, made their escape about 8 o'clock last evening. so great that every possible effort is be-ing made to restore the plant to a work-ing basis. The company has about a hundred men at work.
