The Galveston form of government will be thoroughly explained at the meeting after which a vote will be taken to determine whether the state legislature will be asked

POWER PLANT FOR NEWHOUSE.

The Telluride Power company has entered into contract with Samuel Newhouse to supply electric power to the mines at Newhouse, and will build a power plant of about 3,000 horse power capacity, for the purpose of generating electricity for the power plant. The plant will be completed by Nov. 1. It will probably take two weeks before the Telluride Power company's plant here will generate power, and then only through the use of a temporary flume now being constructed to convey water while the permanent flume, of which about a thousand feet was wrecked by the snowslide, is being repaired. The loss to the company and to the industries in the state which depend on the power for their business are compelled to close down, wholly or in part, till the power can be supplied, are so great that every possible effort is being made to restore the plant to a working basis. The company has about a hundred men at work.
