

Idence of Ambassador Choate. In his talks descriptive of the scenes illustrative of the daily work of the Salvation Army Col. French said: "The slum work in the large cities, is one of the most important branches of the army work. There have been estab-lished 120 rescue homes for fallen women, and over 7,500 of these poor unfortunates are annually gathered into them and brought out of their shameful lives. In the large cities, too, besides the lodging houses for men are industrial homes. The United States now has nearly a hundred of these. The aim of the army is to aid the poor and unfortunate without pauperizing them. When a man asks for money, with which to secure a meal or a hight's lodging, instead of unquestion ingly handing him the cash he asks for, he is offered a job. If a man is worthy of help he will willingly go to work, preferring earning a livelihood epting charity, "At first men applying for help were given jobs in the Salvation Army wood These became inadequate, so a system of gathering waste matter was established. Men out of employment are given wagons and sent around the streets to gather up refuse. Paper and rags are sold to the paper mills. Furniture and clothing are placed in the army's stores and sold to the poor at a price much cheaper than the second-hand dealers sell at. The men who do this work of gathering up discarded commodities and selling them to the poor feel that they are aiding themelves by working instead of begging, and by helping others who are as poor as themselves, During the lecture Maj. Flynn, who is traveling with Col, French, sang illustrated songs. The two officers left this noon for Chicago. Chicago. They expect to return to California in time for the annual Christmas dinner given by the Salva-tion Army to the poor of San Fran-cisco. While in Salt Lake City the men were the guests of Staff Captain Dale at his home, 210 East Seventh South street.

----LOCKED IN A VAULT. Special Sanitary Inspector W. K. Korth
